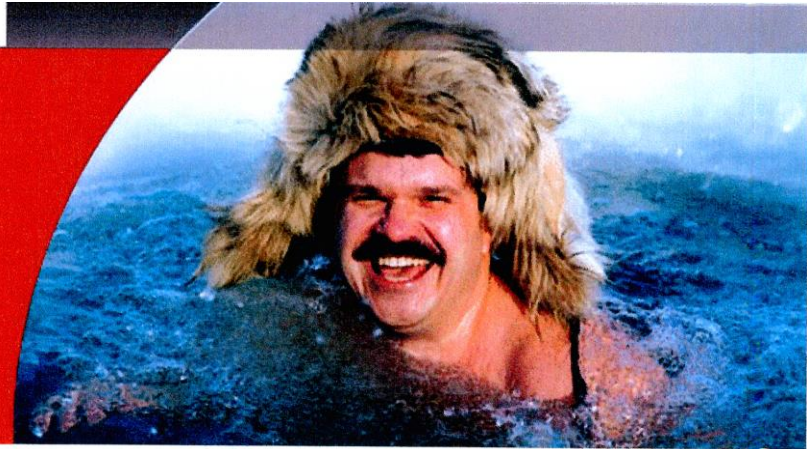

Course Description

The first of a two-semester Russian-language sequence, this course is designed to introduce learners to the basics of the language and culture through a variety of interactive methods. It takes a four-skills approach, devoting equal attention to developing skills and strategies for speaking, listening to, reading and writing Russian. **Join a small group of students and get all the attention that you deserve.**

Why study Russian?

The Russian language has been defined by the State Department as a critical need language, which means that there are not enough specialists who can understand, translate, and interpret spoken and written Russian. The best Russian expert in the USA today is Dr. Henry Kissinger (b. 1923). You can fill in this gap or simply learn the language of 200 million people.

Syllabus

Primary Textbook (you should always have your own book in class): Dan E. Davidson, Kira S. Gor and Maria D. Lekic, *Live from Russia: Russian Stage One*, Vol. 1, second edition (ACTR, 2010). The course pack is available for purchase at local university bookstores and includes 1 textbook, 1 workbook, 1 audio CD, and 1 DVD. The "Volume 2" textbook pack **will not be required until RUS 1131**. If UF bookstore does not have copies of this textbook, please, order it immediately from amazon.com!

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Participation, attendance, homework: 40%

Day-to-day preparation and performance is critical in any language course. Given their highly interactive nature, language classes cannot be "made up" if missed. Poor in-class performance, unexcused absences, tardiness, and late or ignored homework assignments will be noted and calculated into the final grade. If you have to miss class or an assignment, please contact me ahead of time to make accommodation arrangements; those who miss class are responsible for obtaining and completing daily homework assignments.

Class time is your opportunity to practice speaking Russian. That means that I expect you to be prepared in class to ask and answer questions as well as to think creatively about the language you are learning. I will call on you and I will expect you to perform brief skits and situations in small groups in front of the class. I do not, however, expect you to speak perfect Russian...yet!

Homework assignments are included in the workbook and should be completed daily. Please use the homework key included in the *Course Reader* to check your work. As you check your original work (**prior to handing it in**), make corrections with a different colored writing utensil. Homework is to be turned in on the day of every test (unless otherwise indicated by the instructor) with little-to-no errors. Additional weekly assignments should be turned in on specified dates.

Vocabulary quizzes: 10 %

1-2 vocabulary quizzes will accompany each chapter.

Regular quizzes will encourage you to build your confidence by learning key words, phrases and expressions.

Tests (5): 30%

These tests are designed to measure the degree to which you have mastered the material worked on in the units indicated. All will include speaking and listening components.

Final exam: 20%

A cumulative measurement of your comfort with and knowledge of the material covered over the course of the semester. The final will also include speaking and listening components.

The following scale will be used in grading your assignments and in calculating the overall grade for the course:
