This course is a continuation of Beginning Amharic I. It will focus on enhancing the communicative skills acquired in the previous semester. More advanced grammar and expanding vocabulary aiming at fluency in speaking, reading and writing simple sentences using Amharic alphabets in standard Amharic will be emphasized. Culture and language are integrated into all class activities in a systematic way to enable students to achieve both linguistic and cultural proficiency necessary elements for developing communicative competence.

### **Course Objectives**

At the end of this course, students will demonstrate evidence of acquisition of increased skills in the use of Amharic in their daily interactions such as greetings, interpersonal conversation, and understanding of some aspects of the Amharic culture. Students will be able to use additional communicative grammatical constructions with a basic knowledge of the Amharic literature. Student based teaching would be a core method of language acquisition, as learning a language has been defined as growth in participation.

#### **Course Requirements**

Grading is based on a combination of class attendance and participation, homework, quizzes, a term project, reading comprehension, oral dialogue, midterm test, and a final examination.
