Course Description:

This course is aimed at introducing students some complex speaking, writing and listening exercise. The course covers different tasks of intermediate abstraction. It mainly focuses on speaking. The speaking is mostly carried out by students in dialogue, role play and narrative format.

Objectives:

The main objective of the class is to enhance students speaking fluency and dealing with some issues of intermediate complexity and abstraction.

Course Learning Performance Outcomes

At the end of this course, students are expected to reach between Intermediate High and Advance Low Proficiency level according to the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages (ACTFL) proficiency guidelines.

Modes of Communication Aimed for

Interpersonal Communication Mode:

- Students use appropriate Amharic expressions and gestures to greet classmates and different people.
- Students share their trip accounts, places they visit, their hobbies, dislikes and likes of places.
- Students play role in everyday situations, such as buying clothes, negotiate for prices in the market.
- Students prepare and present in Amharic short illustrated personal descriptions of topics, like their home or their family.

Interpretive Communicative Mode:

- Students understand oral and/or written statements in Amharic on familiar topics.
- Students read and/or listen in Amharic to descriptions and identify the corresponding pictures or illustrations, such as people, animals, objects, common activities, and ceremonies.

Presentational Communicative Mode:

- Students write about or orally present simple stories about themselves, their family members, friends on simple sentence, and paragraphs.
- Students write about or orally present their likes and dislikes.

MIDTERM EXAM: Your midterm exam includes an oral performance test which will be done in class (20%) to assess your interpersonal communication performance. It also includes an essay (20%)

that you will write in class. It will include listening comprehension (20%) and reading comprehension activities (20%). The midterm is 20% of your total grade.

FINAL EXAM: The final exam includes speaking, reading, listening, a final essay and a short play that will be performed by the whole class. Your final essay will be a longer essay about yourself, your family, your likes and dislikes and any other thing you would like people to know about you. The final essay is due on the final day of classes – December 10, 2016.
