Course Description

Continuation of AHM3410 with increased emphasis on conversational fluency, comprehension of advanced level grammar, and ability to use Amharic to acquire information, knowledge and critical-thinking skills through reading authentic Amharic texts including current newspaper and magazine prose, selected readings from Modern Amharic authors, (i.e. novels, plays and poetry), illustrative of cultural life in the Amharic speaking society. The course also put more emphasis on argumentative topics, debates hypothesizing and providing opinion on some issues the instructor might introduce.

Course Objectives

The main objective is to continue developing communicative skills to enable the learners to engage in meaningful verbal activities with other speakers of Amharic the social and philosophical ideas expressed literature and other texts they are reading, watching or listening. They should also be able to discuss their research projects and conduct interviews in Amharic with individuals on personal, social and professional topics. It will also help students to engage in issues that are more complex and explain them to their audience.

Course requirements

Grading is based on a combination of class attendance and participation, homework, quizzes, a term project, reading comprehension, oral dialogue, midterm test and final examination.
