COURSE DESCRIPTION & OBJECTIVES:

This course, conducted entirely in French, seeks to strengthen your French writing skills through the review of some grammatical basics and the acquisition of new and more complex structures. Even though the central focus of our work will be written production, students will have ample opportunity to practice their oral skills as well, and you can expect frequent oral and written assignments. Readings will also be included as supplementary materials. Through the study of authentic materials such as articles, songs, films, and/or videos, you will also deepen your knowledge of French culture and thought. By the end of the course, you will have acquired stronger writing skills and developed your French written expression. You should also be able to express yourself in written French with more confidence; communicate effectively on a wide range of contemporary issues; produce well-structured and varied texts; establish comparisons between French culture and your own; and use French confidently outside the classroom.

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COMPONENTS & REQUIRED WORK:

Attendance: Your perfect attendance is expected and mandatory. You are allowed a maximum of three (3) absences during the semester. After three absences your final grade for the course will be lowered by 1%. Each subsequent absence will result in your final grade being lowered by an additional 1%. After three absences, you will also receive a zero in Participation each time you miss class. Absences will be excused in accordance with UF policy. Class Preparation & Participation (15%): Participation in this class is critical and involves a number of variables, including but not limited to:

- Evidence of your **daily preparation** for each class.
- Your **use of French** in the classroom.
- Your willingness to participate actively in ALL class activities.
- Your **cooperation** during group and pair work.
- Your **respect and attitude** toward the class and your peers.

Good participation means that students come to class fully prepared and ready to work. You must prepare all assigned homework **before coming** to class. Students who do not prepare oral or written homework (by studying grammar structures and doing assigned written work), students who do not participate fully in group activities or **speak constantly English** in class will receive a greatly reduced participation grade.

Canvas Discussions (18%): During the semester, you will be required to participate in a number of **Discussions on Canvas** demonstrating that you have acquired new vocabulary, grammatical structures and useful key expressions. Additional information and guidelines will be given on Canvas for each Discussion.

Quizzes (35%): Quizzes will evaluate your understanding of the grammatical structures studied in class, and will be taken in class, on paper. There are no make-ups for quizzes. If you miss a quiz, you will receive a zero.

In-Class Compositions (20%): During the semester, you will write four (4) compositions in class on assigned topics. These compositions will allow you to showcase what you have learned, both linguistically and culturally. There are no make-ups for in-class compositions. If you miss one, you will receive a zero.

Portfolio (12%): Details will be given in class and on Canvas.
