GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

The primary goal of ITA 1131 is to offer a continued introduction to basic communicative skills in Italian while cultivating an awareness and appreciation of contemporary Italian life and culture. Class will be student-centered, and will offer a variety of activities and assignments. Students will build on their previous knowledge, continuing to

- develop verbal communication skills that will allow you to interact in basic everyday conversations.
- develop writing skills as you produce personal narratives and short compositions.

- develop reading skills via exposure to a variety of authentic texts and accompanying activities.
- implement primary grammatical structures in everyday conversation and writing.
- acquire vocabulary necessary for communicating verbally, and in writing, about everyday situations.
- acquire familiarity with some aspects of contemporary Italian life and culture.

You will be assigned a variety of homework assignments from the My Italian Lab site, consisting of tutorials, grammar exercises, listening practice, and more.

- You are responsible for familiarizing yourself with MIL, and for taking advantage of the many resources it offers. The online "user guide" is an excellent reference.
- ❖ You are responsible for completing all of the assigned activities for each class meeting and for each chapter (these will appear in the MIL calendar other than your syllabus one). No late submissions will be accepted, no exceptions. Note that you will need to study the material in the book and view the tutorials before you do the assigned SAM (Student Activities Manual) exercises.
- Some of the assigned MIL activities simply require you to go through a tutorial or practice exercise on your own. While you will not receive a grade for these tasks, it is in your best interest to complete them just as thoroughly and carefully as you would any graded activity.

You have a **maximum of three attempts** on each exercise, and the <u>highest</u> grade of the three will be recorded as your final grade. Please note the following:

- 1. If there are incorrect answers on your first submission a "need help?" button will appear in the upper right-hand corner of the window. Click on it to review the material you got wrong, and then click on the "try again" button to make the correction.
- 2. If your second attempt is also incorrect a small blue bubble will appear beside the answer. Click on it for a hint, review the material again, and then click on "try again" to make the correction.
- 3. After your third attempt, your (highest) score will be recorded, and you will be able to see the correct answers to any items you may have missed. The resulting grades of all activities assigned for each chapter will be averaged, and that score is what will be calculated as your MIL homework grade.

It is strongly advised that you take advantage of all practice opportunities offered in MIL! Go to "Course Materials", select the chapter in which you are working, then open the folders available such as "etext activities", "additional practice", "tutorials", the more you practice the better you will perform!

Attendance

Your perfect attendance is expected. Roll will be taken on a daily basis. If you miss class and your absence is unexcused, you will automatically receive a zero for that day. Repeated tardiness will count as absence.

Preparation and participation

Active participation in class is essential (and fun!) Your grade in this category will be based on a number of variables, including - but not limited to - the elements listed below. Please refer to grading criteria at the end of this syllabus for further details.

- 1. Evidence of your daily preparation for each class
 - It is *your responsibility* to cover all the required material before attending class. You should plan to dedicate 2 hours per day (Friday included, since this is a 5 credit course) to studying, completing assigned exercises, reviewing and practicing.
- 2. Your use of Italian in class
- 3. Your willingness to participate actively in all class activities
- 4. Your cooperation during group and pair work
 - Class time will be spent primarily on <u>communicative activities and practice</u> of content included in the pages studied at home, so it is especially important that you be consistently prepared for and actively involved in all class meetings.
- 5. Your performance in group / pair activities
- 6. Your performance on pop quizzes/oral questions that are used to assess your daily preparation
- 7. Your positive attitude toward the course, and your peers

In addition, you should be aware of the following:

- <u>Unless specifically instructed to do so, you should not visit outside websites during class</u> (My Italian Lab and Canvas only).
- The use of cell phones and other electronic devices (with the exception, of course, of your computer) during class time is prohibited unless otherwise indicated by your professor. Phones must be silenced and put away to avoid any distractions during the virtual meeting.
- There is no make-up for class participation.
- The use of Google translate (or any other translation program) is strictly prohibited, in class and for assignments/assessments.

Be aware that preparation, participation and attendance = 15% of overall grade.

This **five-credit course** requires self-discipline, dedication, and a substantial time commitment.

Quizzes

You will find them in the "quizzes" tab on Canvas. Quizzes will last 15-20 minutes, and scheduled during class time. They will be timed and can be taken only once. Dates appear in the calendar.

Tests

You will find them in the "quizzes" tab on Canvas. Each test will cover two chapters. They will be scheduled during class time, and will be proctored by Honorlock. They will be timed and can be taken only once. Please be sure to watch the <u>Honorlock student video</u> before the first test. Dates appear in the calendar.

Compositions

Twice during the semester you will write two compositions. You will find them in the "assignments" tab on Canvas. They will be timed and available only during class time. These assignments will allow you to showcase what you have learned about Italian language and culture. Dates appear in the calendar. The evaluation rubric is found at the end of this syllabus.

Oral presentation

At the end of chapter 7 you will prepare an individual oral presentation to do live (with your classmates and professor present) during a regular class meeting. Dates appear in the calendar. The evaluation rubric is found at the end of this syllabus.

Oral project

You will work with classmates (group/pair project) ahead of time to deliver a final video. The first day of the last week of the semester will be the deadline to submit a link to your video in "assignments". You will be assessed individually. The evaluation rubric is found at the end of this syllabus.

Final composition.

You will find it in the "quizzes tab' on Canvas. It will be timed and available for you to complete during class time. The final composition will take place during the last week of the semester and will be proctored by Honorlock. The topic will be comprehensive. You will not be allowed to use any reference materials when writing the composition. This assessment will not be administered early under any circumstances.

***Note: It is your responsibility to learn how to type Italian accents when required in all written assessments.

Communication (generally speaking)

- Primarily during synchronous meetings, important information will be given/reminded and questions will be answered at the end of each class.
- One-on-one via Zoom during office hours or by appointment. Scheduled appointments are recommended.
- Via email (through UF email not Canvas). See beginning of syllabus with Prof. info for details/time. <u>Do not</u> e-mail about general course questions. If you have a question about the course, first read the syllabus and all other docs posted very carefully. Contact your classmates if in need to double check about something. NOTE: e-mails and questions regarding material that is already contained in Canvas/MIL will not be answered.

Feedback

- Ongoing oral constructive feedback on general issues will be provided during class meetings.

Content Superior preparation for the task is evident. Ideas are very well developed. A broad range of words and expressions is accurately used. There is evidence of research and understanding of new and accurate information related to regions in Italy (oral project only).	/8

Assessment Criteria for Compositions (25 points)

Language (50%)

Grammatical structures are used with few or no errors. Correct usage of new structures is demonstrated repeatedly. The writing is as complex as possible, based on the student's current level of knowledge. There is evidence of careful proofreading.

Content (30%)

The information provided is very complete and well-organized. A broad range of words and expressions, including vocabulary from the current unit, is accurately used, and there are no spelling errors. The topic is thoroughly developed, with detail provided to enhance the main ideas. In addition, knowledge of cultural issues / traditions relevant to the topic is demonstrated.

Organization (20%)

The composition is ordered and fluent. Ideas are connected, and transitions are used between topics. When possible, shorter phrases are linked into longer sentences.

Grading overview for weekly class participation

Class participation/attendance counts for 15% of your overall grade. Each day is worth five participation points. Missing a day of class (without an acceptable documented excuse) results in an automatic grade of 0 for that day.

15%: The student has read and studied the day's lesson before coming to class, and is ready to go when class begins (Canvas and MIL are open). S/he has carefully prepared all homework, and completes a planned or pop quiz (or other given by prof in class) excellently. S/he is focused and on-task, and replies without hesitation when called upon. S/he interacts exclusively in Italian with her/his classmates and with the instructor. S/he actively participates in group and pair work, and continues to converse only in Italian with her/his partner(s) if they finish an assignment before other students in the class. S/he volunteers frequently, not only to provide answers to assigned activities, but also (and especially) to participate in less-structured speaking opportunities.

<u>14-13%</u>: The student has read and studied the day's lesson before coming to class, and is ready to go when class begins (Canvas and MIL are open). S/he has carefully prepared all homework, and can successfully complete a planned or pop quiz (or other given by prof in class). S/he is focused and on-task, and replies without hesitation when called upon. S/he interacts almost exclusively in Italian with her/his classmates and with the instructor. S/he actively participates in group and pair work, and continues to converse mostly in Italian with her/his partner(s) if they finish an assignment before other students in the class. S/he volunteers frequently, mostly to provide answers to assigned activities.

<u>12 – 11%</u>: The student has read and studied the day's lesson before coming to class, and is ready to go when class begins (Canvas and MIL are open). S/he has prepared all homework, and can successfully complete a planned or pop quiz (or other given by prof in class). S/he is focused and on-task, and provides primarily accurate replies when called upon. He/she interacts mostly in Italian with her/his classmates and the instructor, but sometimes reverts to English. S/he actively participates in group and pair work, but does not continue to converse in Italian with her/his partner(s) if they finish an assignment before other students in the class. The student volunteers occasionally, mostly to provide answers to assigned activities.

<u>10 – 9%:</u> The student has not fully prepared (reading and studying day's lesson) before coming to class. S/he may not be ready to participate (does not have Canvas and/or MIL open) and/or distracted. S/he has prepared some of the homework, but does not successfully complete a planned or pop quiz (or other given by prof in class). The student is on-task, but not fully focused, and may not be ready to reply when called upon. He/she interacts in Italian and English with her/his classmates and the instructor. S/he participates in group and pair work, but less actively than her/his classmates. S/he does not continue to converse in Italian with her/his partner(s) if they finish an assignment before other students in the class. The student may volunteer once or twice, but without confidence due to lack of preparation.

<u>8 – 7%</u>: The student has only glanced at the information for the day's lesson before coming to class. S/he may not be ready to participate (does not have Canvas and/or MIL open). S/he has not prepared the homework, and does not successfully complete a planned or pop quiz or other. The student is on-task, but is unable to participate fully due to lack of preparation. S/he participates in group and pair work, but less actively than her/his classmates, and mostly uses English. S/he does not continue to converse in Italian with her/his partner(s) if they finish an assignment before other students in the class. The student does not volunteer and unprepared to answer accurately when called upon.

<u>6 - 0 %</u>: The student is unprepared for class: s/he has not read and studied in advance, as not completed homework assignments, and cannot satisfactorily complete a planned or pop quiz. Her/his interaction with classmates is very limited or absent due to lack of preparation, and s/he is repeatedly unable to answer when called upon.
