Land Acknowledgement

A Land Acknowledgement is a formal statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of this land and the enduring relationship that exists between Indigenous Peoples and their traditional territories. In particular, the University of Florida resides on land of the Timucua people and the Seminole Tribe of Florida. It is important to understand the long-standing history that has brought you to reside on the land, and to seek to understand your place within that history. Land acknowledgements do not exist in a past tense, or historical context: colonialism is a current ongoing process, and we need to build our mindfulness of our present participation. Course Information

This is a 3-credit intermediate German course for learners who have completed the beginning German sequence at UF (GER1130-1131) or the equivalent. The course concentrates on development of overall skill in language (speaking, listening, reading, writing, vocabulary, grammar) and cultural knowledge.

Course Placement

- If you have taken **GER1130 and GER1131 at UF**, this is the next course in the German language sequence and is the right course for you!
- <u>Some</u> previous experience learning German in High School or other institution? Contact the Undergraduate Coordinator (<u>Dr. Will Hasty</u>) to take the placement test and enroll in the appropriate German language course.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to communicate in intermediate-level spoken and written German. Through daily homework, portfolio tasks, quizzes, and tests, students will learn to express themselves, their opinions and feelings about various cultural topics and other present and past events in spoken and written German. Students who successfully complete the course will be approaching the B1 level on the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages.

Course Requirements

2. Addressing Each Other, Names and Personal Pronouns

German is a formal language, and it is common practice for students to address instructors and instructors to address students with the formal you (*Sie*). Students can use the informal you (*du*) amongst each other. Students should not address instructors with "*du*" or their first name unless it is offered. If an instructor has a title (e.g., Dr.), it should be used when addressing them in spoken and written correspondence. Please communicate with me if you would like to be addressed by a name other than that provided through the registrar. If there is a pronoun that you prefer for English communication, please inform me.

Please be aware that German is a gendered language, meaning that all nouns are designated as masculine, feminine or neuter. There are options for making some nouns that refer to people more inclusive, and gender-inclusive pronouns exist. In our course, we will use first names when speaking about each other in the third person instead of pronouns, and the term "die Person / diese Person", e.g. "Diese Person heißt Diane. Dianes Lieblingsfarbe ist Blau."

3. Attendance and Participation

Becoming familiar with a language requires extensive, repeated exposure to that language. For this reason, **attendance is essential** in this class, and is considered mandatory. Excused absences must be consistent with university policies in the undergraduate catalog, which can be found at https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx and **require appropriate documentation**, such as a Verification of Visit Form from the UF Student Health Care Center (SHCC). It is the student's responsibility to submit documentation promptly and to contact the DRC and/or DSO if there are extenuating circumstances that will result in extended absences.

A penalty will be imposed for excessive unexcused absences:

- After 3 hours of class time missed, 1% per unexcused absence is deducted from your overall course grade.
- Be advised that attending class is not the same as participating. Your instructor will not only record your attendance, but also make note of how well and how much you participate in classroom activities and respond to questions.
- Repeatedly being unprepared to answer or take part in activities will result in a reduction of your participation grade, which will be awarded according to the criteria found on the handout provided to you on Canvas.
- Excessive, consistent tardiness or arriving more than 5 minutes late on 3 occasions will count as one missed class.

• In general, there are **no make-up quizzes, tests or exams**. This policy is strictly enforced; therefore, please do not schedule appointments of any kind for the days of quizzes, tests or exams. Medical emergencies will be handled on a case by case basis but require appropriate documentation to be submitted promptly for consideration.

4. Classroom and Study Approach

We teach our classes primarily **in German**. Communicative contexts and grammatical guides are introduced in class through a variety of activities; acquisition is reinforced by interactive use of new structures and vocabulary. **Daily attendance, thorough preparation outside of class, and participation in class are of utmost importance.** Students normally spend <u>two</u> hours working **outside of class (previewing and reviewing)** for each hour in class to keep up with the pace of the course. It is best to **work often for** short periods of time on a **daily, regular basis**. To actively participate in class and be prepared for exams and other tasks, it is imperative that you:

- <u>Preview</u> the topics of the day listed on the course plan <u>prior to coming to class</u>, including vocabulary and grammatical structures in the textbook, and corresponding homework exercises to be completed on Connect (3 attempts).
- <u>Review</u> the content that was covered after each class, complete the corresponding electronic workbook/lab manual (eWBLM) homework on Connect (3 attempts), and listen to any of the audio and video segments that accompany the textbook for further listening practice.

There is a pronunciation & orthography program included with the eWBLM, which was designed to enhance your speaking and writing skills. Regularly making a serious effort in **preparing daily for class** as well as completing the eWBLM exercises throughout the semester will provide the best preparation for the tests and other tasks. You are responsible for observing all posted due dates, and are encouraged to be self-directed and take responsibility for your learning.

5. Online Translators

When learning a language, using an online translation service can be tempting. Only do so in a **responsible and ethical** manner, e.g., to look up individual words, phrases, grammatical gender, spelling or verb conjugation. **Blindly trusting and using translation services or online dictionaries to write an entire text is not acceptable** and a form of **plagiarism**. Instead of abusing the online resources available to you:

- refer to your instructor, materials provided by your instructor and the textbook;
- **simplify** the complex thoughts you are trying to communicate:
- use cognates, synonyms, and circumlocution with the words and structures that you know to convey what you are trying to say/write.

When intermediate language learners use advanced vocabulary and structures that have not yet been introduced in homework, such as writing or speaking tasks, it is a clear indicator that they have either relied on an online translator or a more advanced speaker of the language. **Both are forms of cheating and will not be tolerated.**

Course Components

In this course, we will cover the final three chapters of *Kontakte* (10-12) and some supplemental materials. A detailed course schedule with daily topics and assignments is provided separately on Canvas.

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Homework and Portfolio Tasks

Homework will be assigned on Connect and should be completed on a **daily, regular basis** to better **prepare yourself for in-class participation**.

- Vor dem Unterricht (before class) these are the homework tasks that correspond to the information about **Strukturen** in the textbook, *Kontakte*. You will complete these tasks on Connect in preparation of each class period as noted on the detailed **Kursplan** (course schedule).
- Nach dem Unterricht (after class) these are the homework tasks found in the eWBLM (eWorkbook Lab Manual), or Connect. You will complete these tasks after each class period as noted on the detailed Kursplan (course schedule).

Some partner speaking/interview tasks may require video conferencing, such as with Zoom. You can find resources and help using Zoom at https://ufl.zoom.us. In addition to the graded homework, pronunciation & orthography tasks are available on Connect as well as LearnSmart tasks, which are a good review of course content and preparation for tests and other tasks.

For each chapter, there will be various portfolio tasks. Portfolio tasks will be writing and speaking tasks corresponding to themes of the chapter. These will be announced and submitted on Canvas. Any homework or portfolio tasks submitted after the due date will not be accepted for full credit without appropriate documentation. It is the student's responsibility to promptly submit documentation.

Tests

Chapter tests will test your skills in familiar ways if you attend class regularly and take your Connect homework seriously. Remember that learning a language is always comprehensive, so it is important that you continuously review all content, vocabulary and grammatical structures in all chapters.

• **Tests** will generally consist of (1) listening and (2) reading comprehension exercises; (3) culture, vocabulary and grammar sections; and (4) brief writing tasks.

There is <u>no</u> final exam in this course - instead we will end the semester with a final project/presentation. More information will be announced in class, well in advance of the due date.
