COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course will guide us through a sampling of Italy's texts and films on the Jewish Holocaust. Centered on the writings of Primo Levi, Italy's most well-known and internationally esteemed survivor, our itinerary will also take us through the historical realities of fascist Italy to a selection of Italian films (Pontecorvo, Cavani, Wertmüller, and Benigni) that, often in controversial ways, deal with the experience of the concentration camps. We will address a series of questions including intellectual death; realities of the camps; the "musselman"; the "compromises" made to survive ("Grey Zone"); and the need to testify felt by many survivors.

ASSIGNMENT NOTES

- **Rubrics** for written assignments, oral presentations, and participation are available in the Rubrics folder on Canvas.
- In the case of presentations, **you must upload all notes and visual supports through Canvas.** If I do NOT receive notes, you will NOT receive a grade for the assignment.
- Unless otherwise indicated, all written assignments should be submitted through **Canvas**.
- All written assignments should be submitted in Microsoft word format (NO ADOBE/PDF). They should be **double-spaced and written in 12 pt. font** (Times New Roman, Cambria, Calibri, or similarly conventional script) with 1-inch margins on all sides.

1. CLASS PARTICIPATION (10%): When you come to class, you should be ready to speak and engage with the opinions of your classmates. Class participation is not about having the right answers. Instead, participation is a question of preparing the assigned readings/viewings and being alert and active in class. It is about expressing your doubts just as much as it is about sharing your opinions. It is also a question of listening to your classmates' opinions and responding when and where you can. Your participation grade will reflect your overall willingness to engage with the work. It will also reflect the degree to which you have prepared your reading homework and the quality of your interventions in class. For further details see participation rubric.

2. JOURNALS (15%): You will be expected to complete a weekly journal providing your reactions to our readings and viewings. The journals will begin with **Primo Levi** (9/14) and end with **Benigni** (11/18), for a total of **9 journals**. Your journal should be at least one page in length. You might see the journal as a space to express your first impressions of our readings/films as well as a forum for developing any ideas you think might be worth sharing in class. In grading your journals, I will focus on the effort you expend rather than on whether all your answers are "correct." You will lose over 1.5% every time you fail to submit your journal. **Unless otherwise indicated, you should submit your journal entry via Canvas AT LEAST ONE HOUR BEFORE OUR TUESDAY CLASSES.**

3. EXAM (15%): At the end of our history introduction, you will take 1 short in-class exam, which will consist of multiple-choice format and/or short essay answers. **Exam is scheduled for Sept. 14.**

4. PRESENTATION: LEVI (10%): As part of a group of 3-4 students, you will prepare and deliver a presentation of about 15 minutes in length. Your group will select one of the topics explored in our readings of Levi and deliver a presentation that defines, supports, and assesses the topic as it is presented and developed by Levi. In the interests of clarity, your group should use visual support such as PPT. **Presentations are scheduled for October 19 and October 21.**

5. SHORT PAPER (15%): You will write a paper of 2-3 pages in length (double-spaced; 12 pt. font; 1inch margins) exploring a single concept or area addressed by Primo Levi. This is not a research paper; you are not expected to include sources beyond Levi's texts and the assigned readings. Topics will be discussed during the semester. **The short paper is due October 28.**

6. FINAL PRESENTATION (10%): As part of a group of 3-4 students, you will be expected to deliver a presentation of about 15 minutes in length. Together with your group, you will select a film not included on the syllabus. Though this film or text does need to address the experience of the camps, it does not have to be the work of an Italian director. Your presentation should introduce your classmates to the work, and it should also consider the work in the light of the texts and films studied during the semester. In the interests of clarity, your group should use visual support such as PPT. **Presentations are scheduled for November 30 and December 2.**

7. FINAL PAPER (25%): You will be expected to write a paper of at least 6 pages in length (doublespaced; 12 pt. font; 1-inch margins) reflecting your thinking and research on a topic to be selected in consultation with me. Work on the final project will be divided into **3 parts: a proposal (due Nov. 16, 2%), an outline & bibliography (due Nov. 23, 3%), and the paper (due Dec. 12, 20%).** Papers must be submitted on the due date unless you have received permission to extend the deadline or unless you have a signed medical excuse explaining your delay. Late papers are penalized and receive no comments. Papers will be graded with regard not only to content and organization, but also to grammar, spelling, and punctuation. Secondary sources, whether textual or web based, must be adequately cited. UNATTRIBUTED USE OF SOURCES WILL EARN YOU AN E FOR THE COURSE. Papers must be uploaded to Canvas by 9pm on Sunday December 12.

CLASSROOM POLICIES:

Attendance & Makeup: Attendance is mandatory and will be assessed by roll call. Students will lose 1% from their final grade for each unexcused absence.
