## **GRADES AND GRADING**

## **Attendance and Participation – 15%**

This is primarily a discussion-based course and as such student participation is critical for its success. Students will be marked for attendance, listening, engagement, and preparation. Details are provided on the rubric for attendance and participation on the course website.

Postings - 15%

Six response postings are due over the course of the semester, submitted to the "Discussions" section of the course website Postings should be one to two paragraphs in length (about 200 words) and reflect a thoughtful engagement with the assigned reading. They will be graded on a five-point scale as follows:

- 0 No posting submitted.
- 1 Posting is "very poor," i.e., extremely short and of low quality
- 2 Posting has missed the main points of the reading/is too short/ is poorly written
- 3 Posting is acceptable. Demonstrates some understanding of some of the reading, but also major misunderstandings with unclear writing.
- 4 Posting is good. Addresses the main points of the text and expresses them reasonably well.
- 5 Posting is excellent. Understands the main points of the text, addresses the topic thoughtfully, and expresses its points eloquently.

Please note that writing longer postings does not guarantee any extra points. Late postings will be deducted one point per day from the due date.

## **Translation Comparison – 10%**

A comparison of an assigned passage between two translations of *Kagero Nikki* (The Kagero Diary / The Gossamer Years).

#### Presentation – 10%

Once in the semester, each member of the class will summarize an outside article or portion of an outside article for the rest of the class. The summary should take about 10 minutes total, even if there are two or three presenters, and provide a rundown of the primary points and argument stated by the article. A short handout or PPT to keep things organized is recommended.

## Adaptation – 15%

A proposal for a modern adaptation of *The Kagero Diary*, *The Pillow Book*, *The Diary of Lady Murasaki*, *The Tale of Genji*, or *The Sarashina Diary*.

## **Adaptation Peer Review – 10%**

Do three peer reviews of classmates' adaptations.

## **Kyoto Visual Tour–15%**

A visual tour of a chapter or section from *Sisters of the Gion, Rashōmon, The End of Summer, The Temple of the Golden Pavilion*, or *The Old Capital*.

## **Kyoto Visual Tour Peer Review – 10%**

Do three peer reviews of classmate's visual tours.
