Land Acknowledgement

A Land Acknowledgement is a formal statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of this land and the enduring relationship that exists between Indigenous Peoples and their traditional territories. In particular, the University of Florida resides on land of the Timucua people and the Seminole Tribe of Florida. It is important to understand the long-standing history that has brought UF to reside on this land, and to seek to understand UF's place within that history. Land acknowledgements do not exist in a past tense, or historical context, rather they contribute to building mindfulness of present participation in colonialism as a current ongoing process. Course Information

GER3330 is an advanced three credit German course for learners of German who have successfully completed intermediate-level coursework in German (for example, at UF, GER 2200, 2225, or 2240) or have equivalent experience. To be successful, students participating in this course must take initiative in the learning process and work in a timely, effective, and courteous manner each week in the completion of individual and group assignments.

Course Structure and Goals

This course is conducted entirely in German and is largely interactive, not lecture-based. This means that your active participation in all partner, group and class discussions and activities is mandatory - and the best way for you to practice using German!

Goals: German Language and Culture 1 is a course for learners of German who are at the B1 level. German is the language of instruction of this course, which is intended to bring you toward the B2 level. While exploring various cultural aspects pertaining to the German-speaking world, we will analyze relevant grammatical structures and linguistic aspects of German. We will take a communicative approach to the German language to enhance your interpretive, interpersonal, and presentational communication.

- The main goals of the course are for you to:
 - better understand longer German texts of all kinds (including literary and non-literary texts, films, music, and more);
 - interact with a degree of fluency and spontaneity with fluent speakers of German without strain for either party;

- produce German more confidently and freely in extended speaking and writing on a wide range of subjects;
- explain a viewpoint on a topical issue giving the advantages and disadvantages of various options.

2. Addressing Each Other, Names and Personal Pronouns

German is a formal language, and it is common practice for students to address instructors and instructors to address students with the formal you (*Sie*). Students can use the informal you (*du*) amongst each other. Students should not address instructors with "du" or their first name unless it is offered. If an instructor has a title (e.g., Dr.), it should be used when addressing them in spoken and written correspondence. Please communicate with me if you would like to be addressed by a name other than that provided through the registrar. If there is a pronoun that you prefer for English communication, please inform me.

Please be aware that German is a gendered language, meaning that all nouns are designated as masculine, feminine or neuter. There are options for making some nouns that refer to people more inclusive, and gender-inclusive pronouns exist. In our course, we will use first names when speaking about each other in the third person instead of pronouns, and the term "die Person / diese Person", e.g. "Diese Person heißt Diane. Dianas Lieblingsfarbe ist Blau."

3. Attendance and Participation

Becoming familiar with a language requires extensive, repeated exposure to that language. For this reason, **attendance is essential** in this class, and is considered mandatory. Excused absences must be consistent with university policies in the undergraduate catalog which can be found at <https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx> ([Links zu einer externen Website](#)) and **require appropriate documentation**, such as a Verification of Visit Form from the UF Student Health Care Center (SHCC). It is the student's responsibility to submit documentation promptly and to contact the [DRC \(Links zu einer externen Website\)](#) and/or [DSO \(Links zu einer externen Website\)](#) if there are extenuating circumstances that will result in extended absences.

A penalty will be imposed for excessive unexcused absences:

- After **3 hours of class time missed, 1% per unexcused absence is deducted** from your overall course grade.
- **Be advised that attending class is not the same as participating.** Your instructor will not only record your attendance, but also make note of how well and how much you participate in classroom activities and respond to questions.
- **Repeatedly being unprepared to answer or take part in activities** will result in a reduction of your participation grade, which will be awarded according to the criteria found on the handout provided to you on Canvas.
- **Excessive, consistent tardiness or arriving more than 5 minutes late on 3 occasions will count as one missed class.**

- In general, there are **no make-up tests or exams** except for excused absences consistent with university policy as described above. This policy is strictly enforced; therefore, please do not schedule appointments of any kind for the days of quizzes, tests or exams. Medical and other emergencies require appropriate documentation to be submitted promptly for consideration.

4. Classroom and Study Approach

This course is taught entirely **in German**. Communicative contexts and grammatical guides are introduced in class through a variety of activities; acquisition is reinforced by interactive use of those structures and vocabulary. **Daily attendance, thorough preparation outside of class, and participation in class are of utmost importance.** You should expect to spend **two hours working**

outside of class (previewing and reviewing) for each hour in class to keep up with the pace of the course. It is best to **work often for** short periods of time on a **daily, regular basis**. To actively participate in class and be prepared for exams and other tasks, it is imperative that you:

- **Preview** the topics of the day listed on Canvas / the course plan **prior to coming to class**, including any grammatical structures and exercises in the *Handbuch zur Deutschen Grammatik (HDG)*.
- **Review** the content that was covered after each class, completing any tasks that were assigned during class, and view any links posted on Canvas under "weiterführende Quellen".

Regularly making a serious effort in **preparing daily for class** as well as completing the *HDG* exercises throughout the semester will provide the best preparation for the writing assignments, tests and other tasks. You are responsible for observing all posted due dates, and are encouraged to be self-directed and take responsibility for your learning.

5. Online Translators

When learning a language, using an online translation service can be tempting. Only do so in a **responsible and ethical** manner, e.g., to look up individual words, phrases, grammatical gender, spelling or verb conjugation. **Blindly trusting and using translation services or online dictionaries to write an entire text is not acceptable.** It is a form of **plagiarism and will not be tolerated.** Instead of abusing the online resources available to you:

- refer to your **instructor**, materials provided by your instructor and the *Handbuch zur Deutschen Grammatik*
- **simplify** the complex thoughts you are trying to communicate;
- use **cognates, synonyms, and circumlocution** with the words and structures that you know to convey what you are trying to say/write.

Course Components

1) Module Topic Main Pages: Links on the main module pages take you to the texts or videos that you need to read or watch in preparation of class as well as the PowerPoints (PPTs) and other materials that will be used in class. Make sure you familiarize yourself closely with the material on the Module Topic Main Pages -- and if necessary, do any further research you feel you may need to do independently. Be sure to have access to the course materials during class - either printed or electronic.

2) Preparation and Participation: This is not a lecture-based course, so your active participation in all partner, group and class discussions and activities is mandatory - and the best way for you to practice using German! Various mini-presentations will also be assigned throughout the semester. To best prepare to actively participate during each course session, your thorough preparation and review of course materials prior to each class is imperative. The Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges provides the federal definition of the credit hour as the equivalent to one hour of in-person instruction and at least two hours of out-of-class work per week in a 15 week semester. This means that on average you should schedule two hours per class meeting to prepare and study for class.

3) Grammar Exercises: You are expected to complete the announced exercises in the *Handbuch zur Deutschen Grammatik*. These will be collected periodically on Canvas. Completing these assignments will improve your written and spoken German, as well as your comprehension of written and spoken German.

4) Writing Tasks: For each course topic, you will complete one individual writing task with one required revision. You are encouraged to speak with your instructor during office hours to go over the corrections necessary for the revision. If you cannot attend office hours, please contact your instructor to see about setting up an alternate appointment.

5) Tests: Midterm and End of Semester: The midterm and end of semester tests will be completed during regularly scheduled class time. They will largely be an opportunity for you to demonstrate your knowledge of structures and your ability to write freely.

6) Final Project Presentation: The semester will end with in-person presentations of group projects, which you will complete outside of class time.

Students are responsible to start all tasks at a time that allows them to finish them within their due date and time. Any technical difficulties must have a [Help Desk \(Links zu einer externen Website\)](#) ticket number if you plan to request an extension. The extension request must be submitted within 24 hours of the technical difficulty.
