COURSE DESCRIPTION AND LEARNING OUTCOMES

This grammar and composition course is designed for students who wish to further their writing and comprehension skills in Italian. Emphasis will be placed on acquiring knowledge of a more advanced or sophisticated grammatical apparatus and vocabulary. Students will be given the opportunity to identify and ultimately employ a broad variety of written styles and appropriate grammatical forms in Italian. This course provides a study of intermediate/intermediate-high level grammar and encourages students to use grammatical concepts and new vocabulary in an active manner. During the learning process, students will be asked to complete exercises on grammar, take exams on grammar, and write compositions on a variety of subjects connected with the written styles of the readings and resources. By the end of the course, students should be able to identify, and appropriately use, the advanced grammar and written styles studied in the course. Taught in Italian.

- Identify grammatical structures.
- Summarize the use of grammatical structures.
- Make use of grammatical structures.
- Recognize different writing styles.
- Explain the general characteristics of the writing styles.
- Practice with the different writing styles.

Course Structure

- Class will meet f2f on Tuesday and Thursday.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Attendance: Attendance is mandatory and will be assessed by roll call. Students will lose 1% from final grade for each unexcused absence. Repeated tardiness will also impact your attendance record as 3 late arrivals count for 1 absence. Absences will be excused in accordance with UF policy. Acceptable reasons include illness, religious holidays, military obligation, and the twelve-day rule (https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx). Should you miss a class for any reason, you are responsible for informing yourself as to what was covered in class and provide a written justification. Except in the case of certified illness or other UF accepted excuse, there will be no make-up option for missed exams or late assignments. Where possible, make-ups should be arranged by email or in person prior to expected absence. In case of illness, student should contact me on their return to classes.
- 2. Class Participation and Preparation (15%): Since this course involves also in-class work and discussion, individual preparation and participation are crucial to group success. You should complete the reading(s), learn about the writing styles, study grammar (such as searching for new vocabulary terms at home, understanding what the content is about, recognizing grammatical structures, studying new verbs and conjugations), and be ready to discuss them. Active reading requires writing—so be sure to mark your text and take notes. Reading homework also includes preparation of grammatical structures (on the textbook and on the resources provided weekly) to be practiced and discussed during class meetings. If you are not ready to contribute to written activities, speak/volunteer, listen, agree/disagree when you come to class, then you are not prepared for class. The success of the class depends on the enthusiastic participation of each and every member. There is no make-up for participation.

- 3. Homework (15%): Assignments will include the completion of grammar exercises contained in the e-book site, compositions, and others posted and specified as due by the professor. Further information concerning the use of the e-book's site of *Grammatica pratica della lingua italiana* will be provided in class and published on Canvas.
- 4. Compositions (30%): During the semester, you will write seven compositions to practice the writing styles and grammar (five collaborative, and two individually).
- <u>5. Exams (40%)</u>: During the semester, you will take four exams. These exams will be assessing grammar. Grammar points tested in each exam are provided on Canvas.

Academic Honesty: Students are required to be honest in their coursework, may not use notes during quizzes or exams, and must properly cite all sources that they have consulted for their projects. Secondary sources, whether textual or internet based, must be adequately acknowledged. Copying and pasting from internet sources as well as any form of plagiarism will earn you an E for the entire course. Moreover, your compositions should be entirely your own work. You must not contact an Italian speaking relative in order to avail of their assistance with your homework as this is cheating, Students using outside assistance will receive an E for the compositions in question. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES SHOULD STUDENTS USE ON-LINE TRANSLATION PROGRAMS. Compositions must be handed in on the day that they are due unless you have asked for and received prior permission to extend the deadline or unless you have a signed medical excuse explaining your delay. Late compositions are penalized and receive no comments, written or oral. Compositions will be graded with due regard not only to grammar, spelling, and punctuation, but also to presentation, content and organization. Any act of academic dishonesty will be reported to the Dean of Students, and may result in failure of assignment and/or course.
