## **Course Description and Goals**

RUS 1130 offer an intensive and comprehensive introduction to the Russian language focusing on developing speaking, listening, reading and writing skills. If successfully completed, students will be able to function in a variety of everyday settings in Russia and speak in short paragraphs about themselves, their backgrounds, families, studies, interests and plans for the future. The course will also expose students to a variety of aspects of Russian culture, current events, and everyday life.
