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A. COURSE OBJECTIVES and REQUIREMENTS

I. The goal of this Grammar Review Course is to help you reinforce and deepen what you already know about German grammar (see Modules for details):

- word order in main and subordinate clauses, infinitive constructions
- subordinating and coordinating conjunctions
- the 'rule' of verbs (Rektion der Verben), prepositions, adjectives
- subjunctive II
- the passive voice
- participle constructions

The level of competence that learners should have reached at the end of this semester is anywhere from B1 Intermediate to the B2 Upper Intermediate Level.

Learner proficiency at the B Level is described in the following terms:

B1 Independent User: Can understand the main points of clear standard input on familiar matters regularly encountered in work, school, leisure, etc. Can deal with most situations likely to arise whilst travelling in an area where the language is spoken. Can produce simple connected texts on topics which are familiar or of personal interest. Can describe experiences and events, dreams, hopes and ambitions and briefly give reasons and explanations for opinions and plans.

II. Required textbook: Hilke Dreyer and Richard Schmitt: Practice Grammar of German. You may download the Dreyer-Schmitt online – both the English and the German version (Lehr- und Übungsbuch der deutschen Grammatik) are available. You are responsible to have either the book or the online version readily available for class meetings. In addition, we use other online grammar sites.

III. How does it work?

Since most assignments are group work assignments (30% of your final grade), it is of utmost importance that you attend the group meetings regularly. **SET UP A REGULAR MEETING TIME AT THE BEGINNING OF THE SEMESTER! IF YOU MISS, YOU ARE LETTING YOUR GROUP MEMBERS DOWN!**

– Individual Study – Classroom Work – Group Work

- **Before class**, you study the grammar topic(s) using Dreyer-Schmitt.
- **In class**, we discuss the grammar topic(s) of each module and work on exercises from the book or an external website.
- **Outside of class:** Then you meet with your group members in ZOOM and record your meeting. The leader of your group submits the link to your recording and word document in the submission page of the group assignment.

Components of the group assignment:

- The first part of the group assignment is explaining grammar
- The second part consists of analyzing how the grammar topic(s) appear(s) in authentic German language. You may watch a video or read a text. For Example: If the grammar topic is 'verbs with prepositional complements' (sich freuen auf + Akkusativ), you will identify verbs with prepositional complements in the video or text. After preparing individually, you meet with your group members and compare your findings.

- A follow-up task may be to create your own sentences using the verbs with prepositional complements. For example: ‘Ich freue mich auf die Weihnachtsferien’.

B. POLICIES

I. Attendance

- You are allowed 3 unexcused absences per semester. FOR EXCESSIVE UNEXCUSED ABSENCES, 1% per absence will be deducted **from your overall grade average**. Documentation must be provided for excused absences, such as UF club activities, illness, and death in your family.
