Course Objectives:

This third semester of Hebrew will consolidate foundation built in the last 2 semesters. The course is based on the book "Intermediate to Advanced Modern Hebrew" written by the core faculty of the Hebrew program at Brandeis University the book serves as sequel to the book from the last two semesters. It contains the functional and contextual elements to bring users' Hebrew language proficiency to the intermediate level and introduce students to skills they need to become advanced in their use of the language, and placing emphasis on the student's ability to use Hebrew in the four skill areas:

1. Listening and Speaking:

The student can talk with ease about familiar subjects and produce more complicated sentences. The student is able to understand the main ideas in a paragraph-length speech, as well as follow the comments of another person in regular conversation.

2. Reading and Writing:

The student can understand sort and longer texts of moderate difficulty. Likewise, the student can compose multiple-page compositions on a variety of subjects.

Course Methods:

Learning a language at the intermediate level is a challenge. After the first stage of language acquisitions, learners experience a gap between the knowledge they accumulated and their ability to function in the language. In order not to make you feel like you are sliding back we will work on reinforcing existing abilities as well as teach new tools necessary to get to the next level.

- In addition to daily homework, we will on occasion take larger, more elaborate projects as a group, in pairs or by you. These may include but not limited to: oral presentations, longer reading comprehension assignments and papers ranging for 800 1200 words.
- Students are expected to participate in class discussions and restrict their speech to Hebrew as much as they can.
- Once a week we will be watching a movie, you will be ready to talk/write about the movie the next day.

Student's responsibilities:

This semester you will be expected to work toward integrating your knowledge of Hebrew with an eye in producing more "natural" utterances and written assignment. As such, the material for which you will be responsible will become more open-ended. Outside of new vocabulary and more set of new or review of grammatical tools you will be tested to a significant extend upon your ability to integrated use of previous material.

The best way for students to meet these responsibilities is to invest serious effort in class and on homework assignments, to learn new vocabulary and regularly review older words, to show initiative in acquiring knowledge of Hebrew in areas of personal interest, and in general to push oneself, especially in areas of weakness.

You will be required to spend an average of two hours a day outside class to do well in this class, though more of this time now will be self-directed. Though every student is at a different level in this class and has their own set of strengths and weaknesses, I expect everyone to make a steady improvement during the semester.

Students investing minimal effort will find this reflected in their final grade.

Required texts:

Brandeis Modern Hebrew /intermediate to advance Vardit Ringvald Oxford English-Hebrew /Hebrew- English Dictionary

Attendances:

Regular attendance in class is required If you have no absences, your final grade will increase by a half a point. 4-6 absences will result in lowering your grade half a point. 7-10 absences will result in lowering your with one point. 12 absences will result in failing the class. Since class meetings are short and typically involve active student's participations, tardiness is especially disturbing. Being tardy three times is equivalent to one absence.

Make up policy:

If a student cannot take an exam due to a documented emergency, written proof of the circumstances must be presented to the instructor no later than the day after the student returns to class. Medical excuses must be on a physician's letterhead, must include a statement that says that the student "could not attend class", and must state the dates on which the student could not attend. A receipt from a visit to a physician is not acceptable. If documentation is satisfactory, the instructor will arrange a time and date for the make-up.
