## **Course Description:**

Course activities will center on reading, discussing, listening, writing and presenting various Hebrew texts including the Hebrew Bible, Modern Poetry, short stories and novels, news articles and newscasts, songs, films and television programs. Texts will be chosen and provided during the semester in accordance with students' ability and interest. We will also engage in creative activities engage such as writing short stories, translating short texts, and playing electronic games in Hebrew.

Course work consists of various written assignments, quizzes, a midterm and a final paper.

#### **Requirements:**

**Attendance**: Attendance is mandatory and will be assessed by class roll or sign-up sheet. Students will lose 1% from their final grade for every unexcused absence. Absences will be excused in accordance with UF policy. Acceptable reasons include illness, religious holidays, military obligation, and the twelve-day rule

*Participation.* YOUR HOMEWORK AND PARTICIPATION THROUGHOUT THE SEMESTER WILL COUNT FOR 5% OF YOUR FINAL GRADE. Full participation means that students come to class fully prepared and ready to work. You must prepare all written and oral homework and be ready to engage with the material covered in class in an alert and enthusiastic manner. Students who do not prepare oral homework (by learning vocabulary and reviewing structures covered in class), students who do not participate fully in group activities or speak English in class will receive a greatly reduced participation grade.

**N.B.** Active participation in class is essential. Factors considered in this portion of your grade include: a) attendance b) punctuality c) preparation d) initiative e) volunteering in class f) use of spoken Hebrew g) positive attitude, and i) in-class assignments. There is no make-up for class participation.

<u>Make-up Policy</u>. Except in the case of certified illness or other UF accepted excuse (<u>https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx</u>), there will be no make-up option for missed exams or late assignments. Assignments cannot be resubmitted for a higher grade.

# Essays:

Essays (20% of your final grade):

During the course you will be required to submit 4 essays of 250 words, and a mid-term and a final paper of 1000 words. Your essays need to be typed in Hebrew. You will also introduce your paper topics for the mid-term and final with a short abstract (also typed). Essays will be graded for content, grammar, and professional presentation. Each essay is worth 5% of the final grade.
