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Course Description: A second year language course for students who have completed Intermediate Italian 1. Emphasis will be on the further development of basic competence in the language and the introduction of more complex ones. Class will be conducted entirely in Italian and thus student listening skills will be developed through frequent exposure to authentic language spoken at normal speed. Class work will be supplemented with homework using a workbook. In class students will have ample opportunity to speak, as much of the class period will be spent working in pairs or small groups. Students will also be exposed to different kinds of Italian texts such as newspaper articles, short stories and web pages, in order to develop strong reading skills. Italian songs and clips of famous Italian movies will be used in the course of the semester as listening comprehension exercises and as an opportunity for discussion on Italian culture. Students will also be challenged to work on writing skills with compositions and longer essays.

Course Objectives:

The objective of this course is to introduce students to the finer points of the Italian language. By the end of this course, students can expect to be able to talk about the distant past, express doubts, emotions and opinions about theater, cinema, music, and literature; make hypothesis; discuss politics and compare cultures.

Requirements:

Attendance and make-up. Attendance is mandatory and will be assessed by roll call. Students will lose 1% from final grade for each unexcused absence. Absences will be excused in accordance with UF policy. Acceptable reasons include illness, religious holidays, military obligation, and the twelve-day rule (<https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx>). Should you miss a class for any reason, you are responsible for informing yourself as to what was covered in class. Except in the case of certified illness or other UF accepted excuse, there will be no make-up option for missed exams or late assignments. Where possible, make-ups should be arranged by email or in person prior to expected absence. In case of illness, student should contact me on their return to classes.

Students are expected to come to class on time. Repeated tardiness will be counted towards an absence. Students should not get up and leave in the middle of class as too much movement becomes distracting to all.

Participation and Homework. **YOUR HOMEWORK AND PARTICIPATION THROUGHOUT THE SEMESTER WILL COUNT FOR 20% OF YOUR FINAL GRADE.**

Full participation means that students come to class fully prepared and ready to work. You must prepare all oral and written homework and be completed ready to engage with the material covered in class in an **alert and enthusiastic** manner. Students who do not prepare oral or written homework (by learning vocabulary, reviewing structures covered in class and doing assigned written work), students who do not participate fully in group activities or **speak constantly English** in class will receive a greatly reduced participation grade.

N.B. Active participation in class is essential. There is no make-up for class participation.

Generally, “A” grades in class participation are earned only by students who volunteer intelligent comments consistently. Grades in the “B” range typically go to students who actively participate, but may be less thoughtful or less consistent in their contributions. Please note: “C” grades are typically earned by students who are prepared and come to class, but make little or no contribution to discussions unless called upon by the instructor. Students who earn “D” grades come to class, but are not prepared and/or not engaged in class discussions. “F” grades are earned by students who are chronically absent or tardy or who openly hinder class discussion in some way (i.e. sleeping or using cell phones or electronic games during discussions).

Make-up Policy. If a student cannot take an exam due to a **documented** emergency, written proof of the circumstances must be presented to the instructor **no later than the day after the student returns** to class. Medical excuses must be on a physician’s letterhead, must include a statement that says that the student “could not attend class”, and must state the dates on which the student could not attend. A receipt from a visit to a physician is not acceptable. If documentation is satisfactory, the instructor will arrange a time and date for the make-up.
