COURSE DESCRIPTION: We will explore a sampling of Italy's texts and films dealing with the socalled "Southern Question." Our itinerary will take us from the anthropological gaze of the northerner, Carlo Levi, through a selection of texts by southern authors, including Verga, Serao, Alvaro, Ortese, and Sciascia to a selection of films dealing with a variety of southern issues. These texts will permit us to address some central questions including but not limited to: the exclusion of the south from "official" history; southern resistance to modernity; social conservatism; mafia & corruption; honor codes. The course will address student language skills through in-class discussion, guided reading, papers, and presentations in Italian.

COURSE OBJECTIVES/STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

By the conclusion of the course it is expected that students will be in a position to:

- analyze the "Southern Question" as well as a sampling of related texts & films
- explains and assess the socio-political and cultural categories that have contributed to the South's exclusion from "official" Italian history
- engage critically, in oral Italian, with representations of a Southern "counter-history"
- critically assess, in written Italian, the cultural & ethical implications of literary and cinematic representations of the South

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

1. Attendance and Class Participation (10%):

Attendance & makeup policy: Attendance is mandatory and will be assessed by roll call. Students will lose 1% from their final grade for each unexcused absence. Absences will be excused in accordance with UF policy. Acceptable excuses include illness, religious holidays, & military obligation:

Class Participation: When you come to class, you should be ready to speak, ask questions, and engage with the opinions of your classmates. Class participation is not about having all the right answers. Instead, participation is a question of preparing the assigned readings and being alert and active in class. It is about expressing your doubts about our assignments as much as it is about sharing your opinion on this or that author or director. It is also a question of listening to your classmates' opinions and responding when and where you can. Your participation grade will therefore reflect your overall willingness to engage with the work. It will also reflect the degree to which you have prepared your reading homework and the quality of your interventions in class. See last page of syllabus for *detailed participation rubric*.

2. Worksheets (20%): You will be expected to complete and submit (via email) a worksheet for our weekly readings and viewings, starting with Levi (1/22) and ending with Crialese. The questions will not be complex but will cover issues such as setting and characterization of south and/or southerners. While some of the questions have a "correct" answer, you should consider this exercise as an aid to your reading and thinking rather than a quiz. Moreover, in "grading" them, I will focus on the effort you expend rather than on whether all your answers are "correct." You will lose 2% for every time you fail to submit your completed answer sheet. There will be 10 worksheets in total. The answers should be written in English. Unless otherwise indicated in class, you should email me your completed question sheets *in advance of each Tuesday class*.

3. Analysis: Histories and Historiographies (15%): On completion of module 1, you will select one of our texts (Levi or Visconti) and write (in English) an analysis of its representation of southern history or historiography. Your paper should be at least 2 pages in length (12 pt. font; double-spaced; 1-inch margins). The assignment is due on *February* 7.

4. Paper 1 (15%): You will write in Italian a paper of 2-3 pages (12 pt. font; double-spaced; 1-inch margins) on a topic relating to the "analisi e miseria" module. Possible topics will be discussed closer to the due date. The assignment is due on *March 14*.

5. *Final Presentation (10%):* Working in a group of 3-4 students, you will prepare a presentation (10-15 min) to be delivered during the last class. This presentation should provide an analysis of a film not studied over the course of the semester. Your group will be expected to watch the film in full and analyze it in the light of the texts, films, and ideas explored during the semester. Each member of the group will address a different aspect of the film. A list of possible films will be provided during the semester.

6. Final Research Paper (30%): You will write (in Italian) a research paper (at least 7 pages in length; double spaced, 1-inch margins,12 pt. font) reflecting your research on a topic to be selected in consultation with me. Work on this project will be divided into 3 parts: PAPER PROPOSAL (April 4, 2%); OUTLINE & BIBLIOGRAPHY (April 11, 3%); PAPER (April 28, 25%). Your work must be

documented accurately, and all sources should be cited in accordance with MLA style. Secondary sources, whether textual or internet based, must be acknowledged in a clearly prepared bibliography as well as being clearly referenced, where relevant, in the body of the paper. **COPYING AND PASTING FROM INTERNET SOURCES AND ANY OTHER UNATTRIBUTED USE OF CRITICAL MATERIAL WILL EARN YOU AN E FOR THE ENTIRE COURSE.** Papers must be handed in on the due date unless you have received permission to extend the deadline or unless you have a signed medical excuse explaining your delay. Late papers are penalized and receive no comments, written or oral. Papers will be graded with regard not only to content and organization, but also to grammar, spelling, and punctuation.
