Course Description: The goal of Polish 2221 is to expand on the students' knowledge of Polish language and culture. As an intermediate course, it is assumed that students have previous work with the language and a grasp of its grammar

Evaluation: This course uses the + / - grading system.

Class Participation and Attendance: A major part of learning any foreign language is its spoken usage. A language does not exist in a vacuum. To that end, 25% of your final grade in Polish 2200 will be determined by your attendance and participation in the classroom. Each day will be worth 5 points graded as follows:

Part of this grade will also be determined by a final project. For this you have 2 options; you may give a 5-minute presentation, in English, about a topic on Polish culture, or write a 2-page essay on such a topic.

Tests and Homework: There will be 3 tests over the most recently reviewed material during the semester. There will also be smaller vocabulary quizzes. Assigned homework is expected on the given due date. Late homework will not be graded, no excuses and no exceptions. Part of this grade will also be determined by your work in the workbook, and "Verb Cards" which you will begin turning in during week 3. **Unless I am notified in advance you cannot make up quizzes that you miss due to an absence.**

Final Exam: The final exam will be cumulative; covering everything we will have studied by then.

Workbooks: Exercises to be handed in from your workbooks will be assigned as we proceed through the semester. You should keep up with the chapters on your own at home. You will also need to bring your workbooks to class as we will sometimes complete exercises from them.

A Note on Language Learning: Most of the learning you will do will actually be accomplished on your own at home. Meeting only 4 hours a week can only do so much. You are expected to study and review what has been introduced during class time.

^{*5}pts – Came to class on time and prepared.

^{*4}pts – Came to class up to 5 minutes late but you were prepared, or on time but were unprepared.

^{*3}pts – Came to class up to 10 minutes late and unprepared.

^{*2}pts – Came to class past 10 minutes late.

^{*0}pts – Absent.

Cheating: Don't do it. You're college students after all. If any student is discovered cheating it will result in an automatic failing grade.

Absence Policy: Whether excused or unexcused, after 4 absences your final grade will be docked 5%. After 8 absences you will be given a failing grade for the class. No excuses, no exceptions. In a language class it is vital that you are present and participate in class. If you already know that you will have to miss 8 classes this semester I highly recommend that you take a different class. (Of course this policy will be amended to accommodate religious holidays. Please speak with me if this concerns you.)
