Course Description:

Beginning Russian is intended to provide you with the basic communicative tools in Russian. You will learn to understand the spoken and written language and to express yourself in speech and writing. You will become familiar with the structure of Russian and the system that through which Russian communicate. You will also learn about the life and culture of Russians today.

Course Objectives:

After completing the course, students should be able to:

Conduct a simple conversation in which they answer questions about themselves, their homes and their families.

Talk about their studies as well as their life at the university.

Talk about their preferred forms of recreation, their favorite authors and composers.

Describe their plans for the coming holidays and for when they graduate (travel, work experience).

Course requirements:

Grades will be determined based on the following components:

Regular class preparation, attendance, and participation: 50 pts.

Day-to-day preparation and performance is critical in any language course, especially in the early years of one's training. Given their highly interactive nature, language classes simply can not be "made up" if missed. A lost contact hour will set you back in your quest to interact competently with Russian speakers and culture.

Lackluster in-class performance, unexcused absences and late or ignored homework assignments will be noted and calculated into the final grade. For each missed class or homework assignment you'll lose 20 pts. of you final grade.

Excused absences and late work may be deemed so in advance of the class (or afterwards in extreme circumstances); those who miss class are responsible for obtaining and completing daily homework assignments.

If you must miss a class because of an emergency, email me before class. Get to know someone in the class whom you can call regarding missed work.

Makeup – permitted only for medical reasons or personal emergencies.

Homework assignments are included in the workbook and should be completed and handed in daily.

NOTE: After each unit there will be a test, reading, and speaking exams.

Tardiness: Students are expected to be on time. If a student is late due to an unexpected emergency, that student should enter the classroom as quietly as possible. A pattern of unexplained tardiness will affect the final grade. If you are tardy three times, you will receive one absence mark.

Tests -(6): 100 pts.

These tests are designed to measure the degree to which you have mastered the material worked on in the units indicated. All will include reading, writing, speaking and listening components.

Final exam: 100 + 100 pts.

The final exam will be a cumulative measurement of your comfort with and knowledge of the material covered over the course of the semester, also including reading, writing, speaking, and listening components.
