Course Description

This course is the first of a two-semester Russian-language sequence that is designed to introduce students to the basics of Russian language and culture through a variety of interactive methods. The course is structured around the development of the four most important language learning skills: speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Class will be conducted almost entirely in Russian. Students who attend class regularly, participate actively, and perform competently on written and oral assignments, quizzes, and tests can expect to be able to produce and comprehend both spoken and written Russian in a variety of basic communicative situations by the end of the semester.

Course Requirements

Attendance and Participation: 20%

Attendance is mandatory. Day-to-day preparation and performance is critical in any language course, especially at the beginning level. **Given their highly interactive nature, language classes cannot be "made up" if missed.** Unexcused absence cannot be made up. Acceptable excuses include illness, religious holidays, & military obligation. These need to be documented excuses. Should you miss a class for any reason, you are responsible for informing yourself as to the material covered. **Except in the case of certified illness or other UF accepted excuse, there will be no make-up option for missed exams/assignments. Class time is your opportunity to practice speaking Russian! This means that I expect you to come to class prepared to ask and answer questions as well as to think creatively about the new language you are learning. I will call on you and I will expect you to perform brief skits and act out situations in small groups in front of the class. I do not, however, expect you to speak perfect Russian!

Tests (6): 30%

These tests are designed to measure the degree to which you have mastered the material presented in each unit. All tests will include reading, writing, and listening components.

Homework (30%), Quizzes (5%), Presentation (5%)

Homework assignments are included in the workbook and will be posted on Canvas. I advise you to complete your home assignments daily, although you are allowed to submit them weekly. The deadline is every Friday before class. Please use the homework key provided on Canvas to check your work (30%). There will be a short vocabulary or grammar quiz every Friday and on Canvas at the end of each chapter (5%). Also, you will be asked to make a brief in-class presentation at the end of the semester (5%).

Final Exam: 10%

The final exam will be a cumulative measurement of your mastery of the material covered during the semester, and will include reading, writing, speaking, and listening components (open-book, take-home).

In-Class Recording
