COURSE DESCRIPTION AND OBJECTIVES

This course provides an overview of African oral literature, introduces some methodological and theoretical problems, and examines the socio-political and cultural relevance of the literature. It stresses the importance of the spoken word in Africa, the nature of African unwritten literature, the training of African oral artistes, and the place of the artistes in the society. It examines the problems raised by transcription and translation of African oral literature, and suggests some possible solutions to these problems. The course also discusses the socio-political and cultural relevance of specific genres of the literature such as the folktales, riddles, proverbs, praise poetry/panegyric, elegiac poetry, children's game songs and lullabies, religious songs and poetry, topical and political songs, oratory and formal speaking, etc. It concludes with an assessment of the changing role of oral literature in contemporary Africa.

All students are also expected to read Chinua Achebe's novel *Things Fall Apart* New York: Anchor Books edition, 1994 for class discussion in weeks 15 & 16.
