Course Description

Intermediate Polish 2 (POL2221) is a continuation of POL2220. The course is intended for the students who completed two semesters of Polish Language and Culture and the fall semester of the language at the intermediate level or can use the language at the equivalent level and have some understanding of Polish customs and history.

After completion of the course the student will be able to:

- Use common nouns, adjectives and numerals in all seven cases
- Conduct a short conversation on a familiar topic
- Use common verbs in past, future and present tense
- Write and present a short speech on a familiar topic

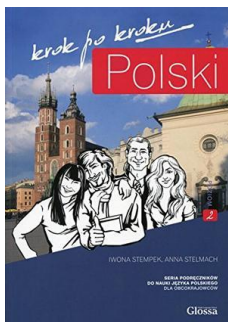

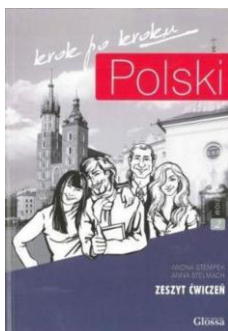

Workbooks: Exercises to be handed in from your workbooks will be assigned as we proceed through the semester. You should keep up with the chapters on your own at home.

Final Exam: The final exam will be cumulative; covering everything we will have studied by then.

A note on any language learning: Most of the learning you will do will actually be accomplished on your own at home. Meeting for one hour a day (four days a week) can only do so much. You are expected to study and review what has been introduced during class time. If you want to learn Polish you will have to do extra work at home.
