1. Course Description

This is an introductory course to Swahili language, history, and culture designed for anyone interested to explore the basics of Swahili language and East African cultures. The course does not require any previous knowledge of Swahili. Students will explore who the Swahili people were and who they have become, who they are not, and the complexities pertaining to term "Swahili". The course will focus on issues that travelers face as they travel around East African countries. It will also introduce important Swahili phrases and common expressions that are helpful in various Swahili speaking contexts such as arriving at the airport, ground transportation, hotel services, restaurant, local markets, safety, safari, etc. It should be noted that this is a multidisciplinary course that will be sourced from various texts newspapers, magazines, booklets, films, music videos, pictures, handouts, websites, etc. Through these sources, students will get a bird's eye view of the East African multicultural settings and the role of Swahili as a *lingua franca*.

2. Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Identify Swahili resources relevant to understanding and familiarizing with cultures of the Swahili-speaking east Africa.
- Understand and formulate their own view of the multiple heritage and diversity of Swahili speaking communities.
- Recognize and use basic Swahili phrases, expressions, and customs in settings such as informal social interactions, grocery shopping at a local market, dressing, health service, weather, and travel.
- Develop confidence in traveling around East African countries.

5.1 A Map Quiz (MQ) [51%]

Two map quizzes will be administered. These quizzes are intended to encourage you to put as much effort as possible from early on in the course in understanding **important physical features** and **political setting of East Africa**. MQ-1: A blank map of Africa with country boundaries drawn in will be provided, as well as main rivers, lakes, and islands. MQ-2: match major ethnic groups & cultures with their corresponding geographical locations.

5.2 Class attendance (CA) [5%]

Attendance is REQUIRED.

5.3 Class Participation (CP) [25%]

Active participation is expected. The more you read assigned texts thoroughly and watch films and video clips actively and think about them seriously, the greater chances are for you not only to **participate productively** in this exploration, but also to **enjoy the class**.

5.4 Reading & Viewing Quizzes (RQ) [25%]

A total of five (5) reading quizzes (RQ/VQ) will be administered as indicated in the schedule below. Each RQ or VQ will have either five or ten items of multiple choice, fill in the blanks, matching item or True/False types.

5.5 Application Assignments [30%]

Students have to answer questions from readings and videos and making comparisons of Swahili cultures and their own culture in areas such as history, people and language, diversity, etc. They will also create their own phrase book regarding what they view as most important survival Swahili phrases and expressions.
