


Course objectives: This semester you will develop your interpretive, interpersonal and presentational skills and solidify your knowledge of Czech grammar and vocabulary within the context of city culture. We will study "Golden Prague" as imagined by writers, filmmakers, artists and architects—as well as by everyday Czechs who contribute to our cultural understanding through their travel writing, blogs or other contributions. You will take a "tour" of various Prague neighborhoods and will have an opportunity to study colloquial Czech, the Bohemian dialect spoken in Prague (Spoken Prague Czech). This class is intended for intermediate-level students and will be conducted entirely in Czech.

**Prerequisites:** CZE 2200 or equivalent (latter per instructor's consent)

**Classroom COVID-19 policy.** The rules listed below will apply to all individuals who participate in lectures or are present in the classroom:







- Only the instructor and students registered for in-person sections are allowed in the classroom.
- Only individuals who are cleared by UF Health to be on campus are allowed in the classroom.

## **Required course materials:**

*Texts:* Susan Kresin et al., *Čeština hrou (Czech for fun)*. New York: McGraw-Hill Primis Custom Publishing, 2000. 2<sup>nd</sup> ed. Our class is not primarily textbook-based this term, but I will refer you to the textbook for grammar explanations so please hang on to it! You won't generally need to bring it to class unless I notify you; it will used mainly for homework.











**Equipment:** Although we will mostly meet in person for those in the face-to-face section, I plan to conduct class paper-free to reduce risk of coronavirus transmission. You will thus need to access and complete materials housed on Canvas (usually One Drive or Google Drive documents like last semester). If you have a laptop computer, I strongly urge you to bring it to class—along with earbuds and a microphone if you have them--as you may be asked to communicate with a classmate on Zoom, and earbuds can reduce feedback.

What if you don't have a laptop or tablet?

- If you anticipate not being able to bring a laptop to class, please print out the in-class materials and bring them to class. (Students can print materials at various locations on campus: see library link below or see Reitz Union resources.)

### **Course Requirements.** Your final course grade will comprise the following components:

Participation: 10% Homework: 20% Quizzes & Exams: 55%

Oral presentations & research paper: 15%

#### Participation – 10%

Regular attendance is mandatory. Unexcused absences—those not due to serious family emergency, illness, religious holiday or participation in an approved academic or athletic event, etc. (see UF policy here: https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx)-will adversely affect your grade. Moreover, you are expected to come to class prepared and ready to engage course materials and other students in Czech!

- ♂ To encourage daily practice & good habits, I will <u>award</u> participation points for:
  - Attentiveness during class and overall engagement in course materials;
  - Being a responsive partner during pair/group work;
  - Preparation for class: Have you practiced concepts in HW so you can produce them in class without delay? Did you open the day's 'na hodině' file on Canvas at the start of class?
  - Consistent use of **Czech** in class!
- ♀ I deduct participation points for the opposite behaviors:
  - Inattentiveness, lack of engagement: texting, Facebooking, working on other things, etc.
  - Being an unresponsive partner in pair/group work, failure to engage in assigned task.
  - Being unprepared for class activities or disruptive: unfamiliar with HW points or extremely slow to recall expressions, not opening the 'na hodině' file at 1:55, etc.
  - **Defaulting to English**; unwillingness or inability to communicate in Czech.

\*\*Absence policy\*\* -- If you don't attend, you can't participate so I expect you to arrive prepared and on time every day! If you *must* miss class due to an excused absence (family emergency, illness, religious holiday or participation in an approved academic / athletic event), please let me know (in advance when possible) and be prepared to provide follow-up documentation. Note that it is *your* responsibility to find out what you missed while absent and to make up any missed work.

Unexcused absences will be reflected in course grade as explained below:

**1-3 absences**: Proportionate % subtracted from *Class Participation grade* 

**4+ absences:** 2% subtracted from <u>overall</u> course grade per absence

**Arriving 10 minutes late on 3 occasions = 1 absence.** 

(I don't subtract points for excused absences, but they will still affect your performance so please contact me if you are gravely ill or expect to miss multiple classes so that I can try to help you catch up! **In-person students can attend class remotely if sick or needing to quarantine!** 

## Zoom policy for remote participation:



Since improving oral conversation skills is a key objective of the course, students are required to have their cameras on from start to finish during Zoom classes. Oral comments on camera and written comments in the chat box are considered participation activities. Please mute your microphone when entering Zoom, but then unmute yourself so you can participate orally. Daily Zoom sessions will not be recorded and archived by the instructor and may not be recorded by students. As in all courses, unauthorized recording and unauthorized sharing of recorded materials is prohibited. If you have technical issues, please immediately consult UF IT Help to resolve them and then contact your instructor.

#### *Homework* – 20%

Homework (HW) is an excellent way to practice Czech and receive feedback penalty-free. It's good preparation for exams and real-life encounters. If you do your homework every day--and do it *thoughtfully*, studying for exams should be a breeze. HW should take about 1.5 hours a night; if it takes you more or less time, let me know! I can give you tips.  $\odot$ 

**How to find & submit nightly homework on Canvas**? Like last semester, most HW will be self-contained within Canvas (e.g., a practice quiz, a Discussion post, etc.). You will find nightly homework assignments in the respective Module for that week. Work should be done <u>before</u> the respective class ("*před hodinou*").

**Late HW policy**: HW is most effective if done when assigned. Since our class only meets every other day this year, you may turn in your HW just 1 <u>class period</u> (or 2 calendar days) after it is due without penalty. Anything after that will be downgraded by half. **NO** late work will be accepted after the respective unit exam. Homework will be marked and scored according to the following criteria:

- + Work shows great skill and/or creativity. **1.15-1.25 points.**
- X+ Good work; satisfies requirement in full. 1 point.
- X Work is acceptable (does not require redoing) but does not merit full credit. Reasons may include: Error patterns from recent corrected work persist, work is sloppy in places (e.g., endings), writing is too short/simple or doesn't utilize lesson expressions as expected. .75-.85 points
- L Work submitted 2 or more class periods after due date: .5 points subtracted from above scores. Work submitted after respective unit exam: 0 points.
- Redo indicated section/s & resubmit with *entire day's work* for credit.\* See teacher for help. **0 points.**
- I Incomplete. Complete missing portion & resubmit with entire day's work for credit.\* 0 points.

\*NOTE that if you <u>re</u>submit homework, my previous corrections will be deleted. I will <u>NOT re</u>correct that work so be sure to either download the corrected version or take sufficient screenshots of it before resubmitting your new work if you want to preserve my feedback.

No student will earn more than 102% for the overall homework grade (worth 20% of total course grade)

Research & Reports – 15% (2 oral reports @ 4% + 1 written report worth 7%)

- <u>Research:</u> You will independently research two city-related topics (a Prague neighborhood, legend, landmark, etc.) during the semester. With special permission you may pick a location outside of Prague for your second report. You are expected to use multiple Czech-language sources (internet sources OK with approval).
- <u>Oral:</u> You will report orally on what you have learned—on the first topic in **Week 8** and on the second topic in **Week 14.** You should plan to speak about 10 minutes, and you should prepare PowerPoint (or similar) slides to accompany your presentation. Your slides should feature relevant headings or questions to guide or preface your talk; a few key, unfamiliar vocabulary terms that your classmates may need to understand your talk (please use dictionary format!); and relevant images or visual aids. While you may have some key words or headings to guide you, you should <u>not</u> read sentences verbatim—and will be downgraded for doing so!

- <u>Written:</u> You will submit a written draft (2.5-4 pages typed, double-spaced with 1-inch margins), related to your presentation topic(s). You are encouraged to submit a rough draft in advance (ideally at the time of your oral presentation) so that I can give you feedback before your final submission during Finals Week.
- Assessment: Please post a copy of your PPT slides to the relevant **Discussion** area of Canvas. You should turn in a written copy of your final essay and also post a backup copy in .docx format to the **Assignments** area of Canvas. You will be evaluated on both content and form and can find assessment **criteria** for both oral and written formats on Canvas. Late assignments may be downgraded ½ grade per day (ex. from a B+ to a B).

### Quizzes & Exams-55%

Quizzes on grammar and unit vocabulary will be given regularly to ensure course goals and to provide feedback on your progress. While most quizzes and exams will be announced in advance, you should be prepared for occasional unannounced ("pop") quizzes, too.

Exams will be given after the end of each thematic unit. Note that this semester **you will also be evaluated on Prague content** (e.g., what you learn about its history, legends, architecture, etc.) and **not only your ability to express yourself in Czech!** As always, grammar and vocabulary sections are graded discretely (grammar errors = 1 point off, spelling errors = ½ point off); sections testing integrated writing and speaking abilities are graded more holistically, based on how well you demonstrate your knowledge about the real world, how persuasively you argue a topic or how well you execute a given task. Since you will be required to perform (to speak and comprehend, not just memorize information), the best practice is regular class participation and nightly homework!

**Make-ups:** If you miss a test or quiz for an *excused* reason (see "Absences"), you should contact me immediately to schedule a make-up. Advance notice is typically required for make-up privileges in the case of a non-medical, non-emergency or non-university-approved event. Make-up exams may differ from original in content and/or format.

\*\*Good student bonus: As in CZE1130, 1131 and 2200, students who have completed <u>all</u> unit homework and have <u>no</u> unit absences can self-correct their exams and then submit their corrections for extra credit. In this way you can regain up to 50% of the points you originally missed. (For ex: a 70% will be raised to a max of 85%, provided all corrections are accurate.) Quizzes, open-book exams, and oral texts cannot be self-corrected for additional points.

**Proficiency Exam:** You will take an intermediate-level proficiency exam at the end of the semester to gauge your overall Czech language aptitude at the end of two years of instruction. More details to be provided. Our designated final exam time is **10:00 AM-12:00 PM on April 29**, but this exam can be broken up into smaller sections with some sections taken remotely if more convenient. So the exact exam time is TBA, with the scheduled final exam block to serve as a default backup if no other time can be agreed upon.
