<u>Course description</u>: This course will analyze health and resilience, comic and serious depictions of the medical profession, and recovery from various conditions affecting individuals or the community, as they have been expressed in French culture and in literary movements and genres from the 17^{th} century to the present.

Optional: If you would like to submit other homework for individual feedback, please send it to me before the class covering the material.

INDIVIDUAL CLASS PRESENTATION: your presentation (MINIMUM: 10 minutes) will start the general discussion of one of the texts studied on the day your presentation is scheduled. You may use one of the questions provided in the Reading Guides or come up with your own approach. After all class presentations, questions and reactions from other students to the individual presentation will count toward their overall participation grade.

<u>FINAL PAPER</u>: Choose another text than the texts studied in class but related to the theme of the course for discussion in your final paper. I have provided non-exhaustive examples at the end of the syllabus and will help you in your search.

Optional: if you would like my feedback, please submit your first draft of Devoir final on April 14.
