Course Description and Objectives: This conversation course material and class is in Italian. This course explores a sampling of social and cultural questions facing contemporary Italian society. Topics such as millennial identity, social media, multiculturalism, the role of television, among others, will be explored through a selection of readings and viewings. The central focus of this course will be oral production; students will have ample opportunities to expand their Italian vocabulary and to enhance their conversational ability. Therefore, assessments will include several presentations and the expectation is that students will participate actively speaking in Italian in each class meeting, and will be ready to report orally about what they read/view as homework. While there will also be written assignments, the ultimate goal is for students to refine their oral skills through new vocabulary use (and appropriate use of grammatical structures) while also focusing on the tone and register of language in cultural contexts. By the end of the course, students should be able to demonstrate their growing ability to conduct relatively demanding conversations to express personal ideas and opinions on contemporary issues/topics.

Required course materials: All <u>reading/viewing material</u> will be available on Canvas. Registration and access to <u>Lingua Meeting</u> for small-group conversation sessions with a native speaker coach. Student instructions on how to register will be provided during the second week of classes on first module of Canvas.

Course structure/ Canvas & Zoom

- You will be joining the <u>Zoom class meeting via Canvas (Conferences tab)</u>. <u>All students must join the Zoom session with video and audio on for the entire class time. No exception</u>. Rules posted on first module on Canvas about attending class on Zoom must be followed. <u>Read carefully the entire Zoom Etiquette</u> doc before joining on the first day.
- You must use a computer (cell phones are not acceptable).
- You must connect from a location with <u>reliable internet access</u>. Video and audio must be clear, no exceptions. No excuse will be given for absences caused by computer related issues.

- You must attend the entire class session. If you disappear, you will be marked absent. If you Zoom in late or leave early will negatively impact your attendance/participation grade.
- You are expected to participate <u>from a quiet, indoor location that is free from distraction</u>. Attending class while riding in a car (alone or with others), working, having meals, hanging out at the pool / beach or participating in any other activities is not acceptable.
- You should remain exclusively focused on classwork for the duration of the class meeting.
- Zoom breakout rooms will be used regularly to allow for pair and small group practice and activities. You must remain on task while in these rooms. The professor will pop in and out to check on progress and provide guidance. You may also call the professor to your room to ask for help.

Course components/requirements

Attendance, preparation & participation (25%)

Attendance: Perfect attendance is expected. Roll will be taken each time class meets on Zoom.

All students must join the Zoom meeting with video and audio on. Joining the meeting late or leaving early will be taken into consideration and impact your participation grade. If you disappear, you will be marked as absent.

An absence is considered *excused* if there is an *acceptable reason* according to UF policy (https://catalog.ufl.edu/ugrad/current/regulations/info/attendance.aspx). It is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor of an excused absence and to provide documentation. Otherwise, the absence will be considered *unexcused* and students will receive no points (0).

**If you are absent it is <u>your</u> responsibility to be prepared for the next class meeting and find out, by <u>contacting</u> <u>a classmate</u> (not the professor), what was covered, assigned eventually for the next meeting, and get any pertinent notes; in addition to follow the weekly module(s) and calendar on Canvas.

Make sure to keep in contact with at least one or two of your classmates. It is strongly advised to exchange phone numbers and/or e-mail addresses to connect outside of Canvas as well.

Class Participation: For obvious reasons, participation is a crucial component of a conversation class. Accordingly, your participation/attendance is worth 25% of your final grade. When you come to class, you should be ready to speak in Italian, volunteer regularly, ask and answer questions, and engage with the opinions of your classmates. However, it is absolutely not expected that you deliver your opinions in a sophisticated and always grammatically accurate Italian. Keep it simple! It is entirely normal that you make errors of expression or grammar at this stage of your studies. Moreover, class participation is not about having all the right answers. Instead, participation is a question of preparing your homework and being alert and active in class, speaking most importantly! It is about expressing your doubts/disagreement about our readings/viewings as much as it is about sharing your opinions on this or that issue. It is also a matter of listening to your classmates and engaging with their opinions. The success of this class, as well as your grade, depends on your willingness to participate to the full. Please do not be shy!

In other words, it is the active, meaningful and informed verbal contribution that you make that is most important to your overall participation grade. Additionally, it is important to demonstrate a positive and supportive attitude to the professor and your classmates.

The last page of the syllabus provides further details on grading criteria for participation.

There is **no make-up** for participation.

**The use of cell phones and other electronic devices (with the exception, of course, of your computer) during class time is prohibited unless otherwise indicated by your professor. Phones must be silenced

and put away to avoid any distractions. <u>Failure to comply with this requirement will result in a greatly</u> reduced participation grade.

Homework (20%): You will be expected to complete written homework related to the topics and content of the readings/viewings. The homework will help you expanding your vocabulary and reflecting on your learning and understanding of the material, in addition to better prepare you to talk in class. You will see homework under assignments on Canvas before the due date, instructions will be included. You should view this exercise/activity as more of an aid rather than a test. Your grade will reflect the effort you expend with regard to the assigned reading(s)/viewing(s) and the level of care you take in formulating your answers and writing in Italian. Your answers should be grammatically coherent. More details about assignments will be given during class as needed.

**Please notice that <u>your homework/assignments should be entirely your own work</u>. Secondary sources, whether textual or internet based, must be adequately acknowledged. Copying and pasting from internet sources as well as any form of plagiarism will earn you an E for the entire course. You must not contact an Italian speaking relative, friend, classmate or others in order to avail of their assistance with your homework as this is cheating.

The use of Google translate (and any other translation/grammar checking program) is strictly prohibited, in class and for assignments/assessments.

Confronto interculturale presentations in pairs/group (2) (25%): During the semester you will, together with a classmate, prepare and deliver two presentations. These presentations will provide an American perspective on topics/issues discussed in our readings and viewings related to Italy. Essentially your presentations will compare and contrast the Italian contemporary topic with how this topic has developed in the United States. Presentations will be scheduled during the second week of the semester and start on the third. Presentations will be given during scheduled class time on Zoom as students learning, participation, and feedback are an important component of them. More details and instructions will be given in class and posted on Canvas. Grading rubric for presentations is available at the end of the syllabus.

Final presentation (15%): At the end of the semester, you will deliver a presentation on a topic of your interest related to one of the issues explored in the readings and viewings. You will select this topic and let your professor know before starting your preparation (please make sure to plan in advance). For your presentation you will be expected to research your topic to add new information. You will give your presentation in class during the last two weeks of the semester. More details and instructions will be given in class and posted on Canvas. Grading rubric for presentations is available at the end of the syllabus.

**Please be aware that your three presentations (total) will have to be on three different topics.

Lingua meeting (15%)

During the semester you will meet (virtually) and outside of class in small groups to practice speaking with a native-speaker language coach. These sessions (5) will allow you to engage in conversation related to a topic we have already completed. This practice will reinforce recently learned concepts and provide you with the opportunity to participate in authentic language exchanges.

<u>Instructions on how to register and access Lingua Meeting</u> will be provided on the first Module on Canvas.
