This course is a four-credit class. Pre-requisites: VTN1130, VTN1131 or with the instructor's permission. Office hours are by appointment, in person, or virtual on Zoom.

Completion of this course with a passing grade will meet the CLAS language proficiency requirement.

1. Course description

This course is designed for students who have completed "Beginning Vietnamese 1&2", or heritage students with some verbal skill but limited (or no) written skill in Vietnamese. The course provides the most needed vocabulary on popular topics and basic constructions of Vietnamese sentences. Topics include daily activities, aspects of Vietnamese culture, history, educational system, geography, and arts. The first weeks reviews the Vietnamese sounds and introduce the Vietnamese writing system. Authentic Vietnamese materials will be used for reading, writing, and listening exercises. Attendance is mandatory.

Course Learning Goals

By the end of the course, students will be able to

- understand others and talk about self or others (fields of study, interests, plans for career, hobbies...), and on topics such as renting, chores, cuisines, healthcare, entertainments and hobbies, and transportation.
- use grammatical constructions for aspectual modes; times expressions; usage and nuances of particles to express surprise, confirmation, condition, probability, approval, habits, and reciprocity.
- use conjunctions in complex sentences, and topic-comment particles.
- read and listen to authentic texts and narrative describing daily situations

Students are encouraged to employ critical thinking and to rely on data and verifiable sources to interrogate all assigned readings and subject matter in this course as a way of determining whether they agree with their classmates and/or their instructor. No lesson is intended to espouse, promote, advance, inculcate, or compel a particular feeling, perception, viewpoint or belief.

Class notes If you miss a class, check with your classmates the materials covered in that class.

Quizzes, exams Exams and short quizzes are given during regular class hours.

Quizzes are pop-up. There are no make-up quizzes or exams. A grade of zero will be assigned to any missed quiz or exam unless you provide documented medical, technical/emergency reasons, then the grade for a missing quiz or exam will be prorated at the end of the course. If you had technical issues and cannot login for class that day, please email me as soon as possible.

Homework post and essays Are graded for submissions, not based on mistakes. However, repeated spelling mistakes costs the points. Every two to three spelling mistakes will reduce 1 point from your grade.

Presentation Your presentation should include a summary in Vietnamese and any new vocabulary your classmates need to know to follow your talk. English should not be used and the list of new vocabulary should be kept to a minimum. The topics are approved by the instructor. If you wish to work with a classmate, you both share the grade.

You can use various media to illustrate your presentation, e.g., YouTube video clips, individual blogs, excerpts from newspapers or magazines, etc.

Everyone is expected to attend and participate in all presentations (asking questions, making comments, etc). Asking questions is a part of your presentation's grade.

Class participation BE VISIBLE and contribute to class discussions. Ask questions. Offer answers or comments.

Attendance and make-ups

Attendance is mandatory and will be assessed by roll call. Acceptable excuses include illness, religious holidays, & military obligation. These need to be documented excuses (e.g., a letter from a doctor/infirmary/clinic, police report, receipts for car repair, court orders, funeral arrangements, conferences, job interviews, etc.). You are allowed **two unexcused absences**; having more than two will affect your total grade: deduction of **0.5** % (2 pts) from the total grade for each absence without a documented medical reason. *Missing 14 or more classes might result in failing the course*. Repeated tardiness will also reduce your grade.

Should you miss a class for any reason, you are responsible for informing yourself as to the material covered. Except in the case of certified illness or other UF accepted excuse, there will be no make-up option for missed exams/assignments. Where possible, make-ups should be arranged prior to absence. Alternatively, students should contact me on return to classes.

RUBRICS

HOMEWORK, ESSAYS (120pts)

Depending on the student's language background, every 1-2 spelling mistakes cost one point. Every repeating spelling mistake costs one point, max. 50% of the total points. Grammatical mistakes and wrong uses of vocabulary don't count toward grades. Each missing homework or essay costs 12 points.

QUIZZES, EXAMS (220pts)

Each question in the quiz or exam is assigned their total points.

Depending on the student's language background, every one to three spelling mistakes cost 1pt.

Every grammatical mistake reduces 1-2pts, depending on seriousness.

Every vocabulary mistake reduces 1-2pts, depending on seriousness.

PRESENTATION (60pts)

An A-presentation doesn't rely on written notes, uses only Vietnamese language, simple and correct sentences, images, videos, etc.; makes sure everyone in class can understand; applies learned grammatical points and the vocabulary as much as you can; no spelling or grammatical mistakes; every member understands and answer questions from the audience. A B-presentation has to look at cards sometimes, uses some English, some vocabulary or grammatical structures are difficult for non-heritage students, and may have some minor grammatical mistakes. A C-and-below presentation regularly relies on notes or English for explanations and/or understanding of the questions, translates the whole sentences to English, and has spelling mistakes by any member of the group.

In-Class Recording
