## 1. Objectives

This course is designed for heritage students with some previous exposure to the Vietnamese language, for those who have completed 'Intermediate Vietnamese 1' or for students with verbal skills but limited writing and reading skills. It continues to improve all language skills, with emphasis on reading and writing. Students will be given topics to discuss in class through the use of short stories, poems, articles on daily life in Vietnam, or visual materials on the Vietnamese culture. Vietnamese songs and other recordings will be used for listening drills. Writing will be assigned weekly. The language of instruction is Vietnamese throughout most of the course. Attendance is mandatory.

This course is required for Dual Track Language Major with Vietnamese is one of the two.

OR you might be able to just activate the Viet keyboard in Windows that comes preinstalled in your computer.

**General note**: Any component of this syllabus may be *modified* during the semester to accommodate pedagogical need and student progress.

Class notes If you miss a class, check with your classmates the materials covered in that class.

Quizzes, exams Exams and short quizzes are given during regular class hours.

There are no make-up quizzes or exams. A grade of zero will be assigned to any missed quiz or exam unless you provide documented medical/emergency reasons, then the grade for a missing quiz or exam will be prorated.

Homework Expect to spend at least 7-10 hours per week at home in order to do well in

this course. Coming to class well prepared helps you to learn most effectively.

Homework assigned daily. Late homework will **NOT** be accepted. **Each missing or forgotten homework will reduce 10% of your total homework grade (6 pts).** You are not punished for grammatical or word usage mistakes. However, <u>spelling mistakes will be calculated. Every 3 mistakes costs you 1 pts</u>).

If you have difficulty doing your homework or understanding the lesson, seek help – come to my office, or ask members of your study group. Don't struggle alone.

An A for homework if all homework assignments are done with care, no spelling mistakes. A B grade if you miss a few assignments, and there are some spelling mistakes. A C-and-below is expected if you don't often do homework, or often with repeated spelling mistakes. If you have difficulty doing your homework, you should come to my office hours to get some help, or help from your group during group time. Do not struggle by yourself.

Presentation

You can do your own presentation or pair up with another student. In that case both will share the grade. The presentation is about 5-10 minutes followed by a question part. The topic can be anything related to the topics we cover in class, or something you are interested, with the instructor's approval. You can use various media to illustrate your presentation, e.g., YouTube video clips, individual blogs, excerpts from newspapers or magazines, etc.

An **A-presentation** uses only Vietnamese language during the presentation; uses simple and correct sentences; "talking" instead of "reading" from scripts; selects images, videos, etc. to make sure everyone in class can understand; applies grammatical points and the vocabulary learned during the term as much as you can; no spelling mistakes, no major grammatical mistakes; members help each other in the final proof of the whole presentation; understand and answer questions. A B**presentation** needs to use English from time to time; still relies on notes; has a lot of new vocabulary or grammatical structures that make it difficult to understand for non-heritage students; makes statements about something without checking for correctness; contains very few major grammatical mistakes; might not understand some questions. A C-and**below presentation** relies heavily in English, translates the whole sentences to English; contains a lot of spelling mistakes; members in the group did not work and help each other (e.g., mistakes in spelling and grammatical constructions, vocabulary use). Don't often understand questions, and have to consult each other in English before answering. Everyone is expected to attend and participate in all presentations (asking questions, making comments, etc). Your absences during your classmates' presentations will affect the grade of your group presentation. All members of the group will receive the same grade. Students often love group work and presentations. Expect fun!

Verbal participation This is a language class, verbally contributing to class discussions is important. **Ask** meaningful questions that contribute to the understanding of the lessons. **Offer** answers and comments...

An **A grade** requires the student to participate in daily class discussions. A **B grade** is for participation, but not as regularly. Very little or no

participating in class discussions results in a C-and-below grade in this category.

**Office hours** At any moment during the term, if you feel confused or behind, please come to my office to get help right away. If you cannot make it during office hours, email me a few options and I will find the time to be available for you. Do NOT wait until late in the course to catch up, or to ask for extra work for extra credits. In language learning it takes a lot of time to process the materials and to practice, no matter how smart you are. If you seriously work as instructed, and seek helps when needed, you will do well in this class, regardless of the language background you come with.

## Attendance policy and email etiquette

Absences due to illness, special curricular requirements or emergency are excused only if paper documentation is presented (e.g., a letter from a doctor/infirmary/clinic, police report, receipts for car repair, court orders, funeral arrangements, conferences, job interviews, etc.); emails will not suffice. Religious holiday and severe weather conditions are excused. "A student should inform the faculty member of the religious observances of his or her faith that will conflict with class attendance, with tests or examinations, or with other class activities prior to the class or occurrence of that test or activity". You are allowed **two unexcused absences**; having more than two will affect your total grade: deduction of 1% (4 pts) for each absence without a documented medical reason. Missing 14 or more classes might result in failing the course. Repeated tardiness will also reduce your grade. In the event you must miss a class, please contact the instructor **prior** to the class meeting and have your absence pre-approved, except for documented emergency.
