The class is being offered after a long hiatus and will be a pilot class. Its focus is on oral practice with emphasis on the structure of oral communication and oral presentation regarding topical subjects. It will be tailored to current needs for communication across various disciplines and interests such as the coverage of news culled in various media, ecology, urban planning, intercultural exchanges, audio-visual communication, culinary experiences, as well as travel. The class, as designed will be useful to those planning to use French in a variety of professions.

Prerequisite: FRE 3410 or the equivalent.
