Course Description/objectives

This course is the Elementary Korean language course designed for those who have taken KOR 1130 or have an equivalent proficiency level. Students will develop basic language skills further acquired in KOR 1130. Having learned three basic tenses in KOR 1130, students will master many different sentence endings to express various meanings such as desire, ability, obligation, intention, certainty, and promise throughout the semester. Also, students will learn more clausal connectives to express more complex relations between two events such as cause, reason, purpose, concession, background, condition, etc. In addition, we will continue to introduce Korean culture every chapter to provide a better understanding of cultural applications on language.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the end of the course, students will be able to:

- (1) carry on a conversation on generally predictable topics related to daily activities and personal environment,
- (2) understand the main ideas and supporting ideas when people talk about familiar topics,
- (3) understand some information from reading simple connected texts dealing with a limited number of personal and social needs.
- (4) write a series of simple sentences on personal information and well-known and rehearsed content.

Attendance

Attendance check will be strictly enforced; extremely low attendance may lower your final grade further, unless a

written proof of inevitable circumstance is provided. You may miss 3 sessions without any penalty. Every absence thereafter results in minus 1% deducted from your final grade unless the absence is a documented excuse. Please be punctual because you may miss important information and distract your classmates. If you are late to class, you will not be given extra time to complete the exams and quizzes. If you are more than five minutes late three times without your instructor's consent, they will be counted as one absence. If you are more than 30 minutes late, it will also be considered as one absence. If you are late or miss class for any reason, it is your responsibility to contact your instructor or ask your classmates to know what you have missed and what you need to do for the following day.

Participation

This course is a language and culture class and your participation is very important. Participation is 10% of your total grade along with attendance. Your performance will be monitored and graded by your instructor each day. The grading criteria not only includes your Korean language performance, but also your preparation, participation, attitude, and cooperation.

Distracting behavior and disrespectful behavior such as uninvited casual talk among students, sleeping, use of lap tops, cell phones, and any other electronic device, not bringing class materials to class, studying for other class, doing homework, long/frequent breaks, etc. are strongly discouraged and will be noted for participation grade deduction.

Homework

Put all your homework on the instructor's desk before class begins on the due date it is scheduled on the syllabus. Workbook homework must be stapled with your full name at the top of the first page.

(1) Workbook HW (20pts): Workbook homework will be graded in two steps.

First, submit the selected sections of the workbook. It is expected that you will make mistakes; you will not be marked down for doing so. You will get 10pts, as long as you complete your homework and turn it in on time. You will get 0 pt if your homework has missing/ incomplete sections.

Second, self-correct your HW based on the answer key provided on Canvas and turn it in on time, and you will get another 10pts. You will get 0 pt if your homework has missing/ incomplete sections or no self-correction (even if partial). There is no partial point.

If you have a specific question or exercise that you want your instructor to check, please make a note of it. Otherwise, the instructor will spot-check students' self-corrected homework. Please remember to use a color pen for correction (any color but red).

(2) <u>Dictation Portfolio (10pts)</u>: Dictation practice will be done almost every class. Please bring a <u>designated dictation</u> notebook and a <u>color pen</u> for correction (any color but red). The dictation notebook will be collected <u>on your lesson test</u> <u>day</u> (see daily schedule) and graded based upon your <u>correction</u>.

Examinations

- (1) <u>Vocabulary quizzes</u> will be given two times per lesson and <u>dictation test</u> one time per lesson.
- (2) There will be 4 Lesson tests. Grammar, reading, listening and writing will be the principal items tested in the lesson

tests.

(3) There will be 1 mini-skit and 2 oral tests. (Guidelines will be provided later)

Presentations

- (1) Presentation #1 (Individual): Show & Tell (Guidelines will be provided later)
- (2) Presentation #2 (Group): Mini-movie (Guidelines will be provided later)

Extra credit and other important notes

(1) Event/Movie/book review (0.25% each)

Please attend a Korean event (will be announced whenever available), watch a Korean movie or read a Korean book. Write a review in Korean (10 sentences or more). For a Korean event, please attach the event ticket or photos. You may submit up to 4 reviews (up to 2 per category: e.g. 3 movie reviews will not be accepted).

(2) You have a very limited exposure to Korean outside of the class, and it is very important that you make every use of the precious opportunities to speak Korean in class. Therefore, you may be asked to speak only Korean in class. A limited amount of English will be used by the instructor to explain grammar in class, at the discretion of the instructor.

Important Notes:

- (1) Read the conversations/narrations before coming to class. Prepare for active participation in class. This is an intensive language course for which you will receive five credit hours. Therefore, you are expected to study for the course at least two hours every day.
- (2) Listen to the audio file of C1, C2, N of every chapter and practice speaking it out loud. Making this a part of your study habits can benefit you by greatly increasing your pronunciation and overall Korean language skills.
