

Optional: You may also send me other written homework in response to questions in the <u>READING</u> GUIDES if you would like feedback.

<u>INDIVIDUAL CLASS PRESENTATION</u>: your presentation (MINIMUM: 10 minutes) will start the general discussion of one of the texts studied on the day your presentation is scheduled. You may use one of the questions provided in the Reading Guides or come up with your own angle. After a class presentation, questions and reactions from other students will count toward their participation grade.

<u>FINAL PAPER</u>: Along with your individual class presentation, the grade you will receive for this assignment will serve as <u>assessment of your "graduating senior" level</u>. The final paper includes an annotated bibliography and should analyze another text than those we studied together. For non-exhaustive suggestions of other texts to choose, see the last page of the syllabus.
